

## Among The Farmers

(Federation of Agriculture News)

### CHEAPER PRODUCTION

The suggestion, that in the interest of the consumer the farmer must learn to produce cheaper, may have some merits but if it creates the impression that the farmer is an inefficient producer and is adding unnecessary costs to his products, then the suggestion creates an unfair impression.

Traditionally in Canada food has been abundant and cheap, cheap because with various products at different times the farmer has, in addition to his labour and capital investment, contributed to the charge a portion of his soil fertility and, in many cases, the unpaid labour of his wife and family. Without any doubt, over a long period of years the consumer has benefitted to a marked degree from a state of affairs in which the farmer and his family worked for little or nothing.

In this Province, on the average, the farm family is entitled for income tax purposes, to a statutory exemption of approximately \$2,300.00. The average income of the farm family is roughly \$1,000.00, which means that the farm family is living on about one half what the income tax people consider to be fair and reasonable. In the light of this situation just how much further can the farmer be reasonably expected to go in lowering his production costs?

A study made by the United States House of Representatives Agricultural Committee provides information to the effect that since 1951 in that country farm prices fell 20% but at the same time the cost of food declined little, if any, to the consumer and in some cases rose.

### A BLESSING

An editorial in the August 23 issue of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald comes to the surprising conclusion that the present difficulties of the western wheat grower are a blessing in disguise and criticizes the wheat people for objecting to accepting lower prices for their product. The wheat grower is pictured as the pet of the federal government and is the recipient of more direct aid than any other industry, primary or secondary, in Canada.

### HARVEST TIME

Farm operations are now entering a phase which has very special appeal—the harvesting of the grain crop. The grain harvest is a neat operation either when the crop is tied up in sheaves or when handled in one operation by combine. The orderly rows of stocks are succeeded by the orderly rows of stubble marching over the fields like well-trained soldiers on parade. The whole operation is carried on in cool weather and is not, for the most part, involve the heavy work of haying. All this tends to give the farmer a feeling of pleasurable anticipation as harvest time approaches.

### FERTILIZER CHANGES

Next year two new mixed fertilizers will be offered for sale. The Maritime Fertilizer Council recently arrived at the decision to discontinue the manufacture of 5-10-10 and replace it with a new formula 6-12-12. The new fertilizer will cost more per ton but will be cheaper per unit of plant food as 1,666 pounds of the new fertilizer will equal a ton of the old 5-10-10. The advantages of the change will be, in addition to the cheaper cost—less handling, fewer bags and lower transportation costs. A change which saves the farmer both money and work should meet with the general approval of all concerned.

## Strange But True

"Roof-top farms" in the sunny climates of the world may be the source of proteins and fats for a hungry world in the years that lie ahead, so believes, Dr. Bruce Mead, associate professor of engineering at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Dr. Mead already has a farm growing crops on the roof of the college's engineering building. The project is based on a small-one celled plant known as Chlorella, similar to green scum in stagnant pools of water. From sunshine, water, and small amounts of chemicals, these tiny plant cells are capable of producing tons of proteins and fats.

The process of growing the plant might be feasible in small tanks on farms to provide rich supplements for cattle feed, Dr. Mead said. Harvesting would be a simple matter. All one would have to do would be to scoop off the chlorella floating on the surface of the water.
