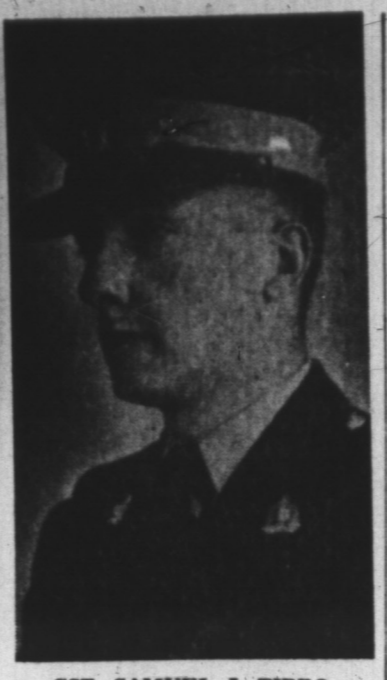

Reports of school and sick

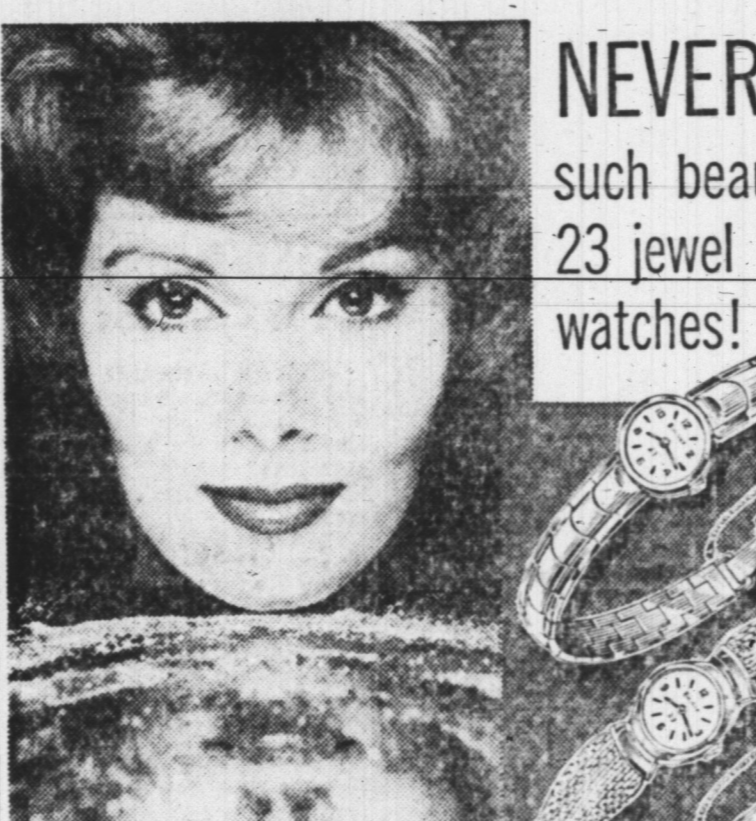
committees were given and bills were paid.
