Almost without realizing it, we are adopting the language of madmen. We talk of "clean" hydrogen bombs, as though we are dealing with the ultimate in moral refinement...

What kind of monstrous imagination is it that can connect the word "clean" to a device that will put the match to man's cities? Yes; what is really meant by "clean" is that we may be able to build a bomb with a greatly reduced potential for causing radioactive fallout.

Or we will use the term "sunshine units" to measure the amounts of radiation suffered by people as the result of nuclear explosions. Serious research reveals that any added radiation shortens life.

Tears aren't merely drops of salt water; far from it. They are a complex solution with a high protein content. And scientists can read them almost as easily as scanning the pages of a book.

Not only do tears tell something about who shed them, but it's usually possible to determine, to some extent, why they were shed.

Tears shed by adults are different from those of children, and scientists can easily tell which is which.

Moreover, they can also tell whether the tears were brought on by irritants, such as smog or onions, by whether they were caused by pain, anger, sorrow or joy.

Certain odors irritate the lachrymal gland, causing it to shed profusely, thus blinding the eyes with tears.

But this is just one way in which nature protects your eyes. DUAL ROLE

No less wonderful is the work of your eyelashes which serve as a dust stopper and your eyebrows which have the dual role of keeping out dust and preventing perspiration from dripping into your eyes.

Don't, however, leave everything up to nature. Have a regular eyesight examination by a competent eye specialist at least every other year.

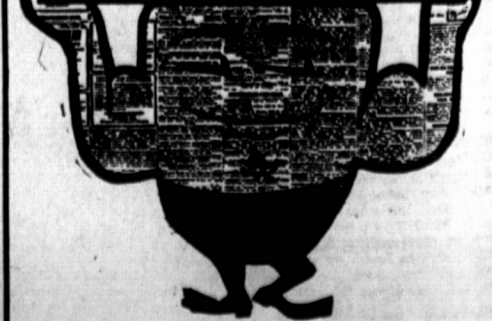

Money In Buffalo Bones

The Dallas News In west Texas some old-timers can remember when the most effective drought relief was not government hay but buffalo bones.

When sun and wind parched the Prairies in the early 1880's, many a frontier farmer and ranchman kept his family from going hungry by gathering buffalo bones and selling them.

Large sections of the grasslands were strewn with the whitening bones of several million buffaloes killed by the hide hunters in 1874-79.

The bones were shipped to carbon works in St. Louis and eastern cities. The old, weather-beaten ones were ground into meal for use as fertilizer. A few choice ones went into bone china.

But most of them were prepared for use in refining sugar. Horns were used in making buttons, combs and knife handles.

Prices varied considerably but averaged about \$8 a ton. At Colorado City, John W. Moorar, who was hauling barbed wire from the railroad to Charles Goodnight's ranch, came back each time with a load of bones.

Voting In The Spring

Winnipeg Free Press The federal Minister of Public Works, Mr. Howard Green, predicted last weekend that Mr. Diefenbaker will call a general election "before next July."

Mr. Green's position makes it impossible to treat this remark as quite the unofficial private opinion he claimed. After all, Mr. Green is not merely a member of the cabinet; he is the Minister to whom Mr. Diefenbaker entrusted the role of deputy Prime Minister during the early days of the Government.

When Mr. Diefenbaker himself had to go to London for the Commonwealth conference, and Mr. Green is a man who would light-heartedly continue the free-speaking habit that opposition permits; he has the temperament to recognize promptly the disciplines of collective responsibility that apply to men in office.

It is unlikely, therefore, that he would say what he did without his leader's foreknowledge. FLYING A KITE? The more reasonable explanation is that he was flying a kite on behalf of Mr. Diefenbaker.

Mr. Green's prediction is certainly in line with the way most leading Conservatives are thinking. They cannot at this stage show their hand officially, but it is natural that they should wish, by means of such "unofficial" remarks as Mr. Green's, to get the public (and their own party workers) accustomed to the idea of an election next spring.

The range of expert speculation at Ottawa seems to lie between the end of March and June as providing the election date. Some people seem to think that after a short fall session, Mr. Diefenbaker will re-assemble the present Parliament in late January. If once it gets sitting then, the necessary business is unlikely to be cleared away in time for a general election much earlier than this year's — that is, in June.

BRIGHTEST COMET?

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—A new comet—rivaling and perhaps surpassing in brightness any seen since 1910 or 1911 — now has moved into a position where Millions of North Americans may easily view it.

The Harvard College observatory reported Tuesday, Dr. Donald Menzel, director of the observatory, said it now may be seen soon after sunset, below the Big Dipper.
