ADDITIONAL TALKS SCHEDULED TODAY

Peardon and De Gaulle Discuss Methods to Achieve Closer Ties

PARIS (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson and President de Gaulle Wednesday exchanged frank assessments of East-West relations and dealt with matters directly affecting their two countries.

In a conference extended at the scheduled one hour, the two leaders discussed the cold war from the standpoint of future East-West relations.

It is understood they also explored ways to improve economic and cultural contacts between Canada and France, possibly aiming at consultative machinery similar to the periodic Canada-United States cabinet conference.

In discussion of cultural relations, exchanges were high on the list.

While Pearson and de Gaulle conferred at the Elysee Palace, External Affairs Minister Martin held a session with French Foreign Minister Couve de Murville and later saw the director-general of the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization Robert M. Heu.

PARIS (AP)—The 12-story steel and concrete skeleton of an apartment house collapsed Wednesday killing at least 15 workmen.

Another 18 workmen were injured, and rescuers dug frantically toward the weak cries of those buried under the estimated 100,000 tons of debris.

Police and army engineers moved into the 26- by 50-year-old pile of ruins with mobile cranes to remove the debris.
