## Conservatives Will Have 2nd Largest Group

### Stalemate Seen As Result Of Manitoba Elections — Progressives Win 18 Seats, Lead In 6 Others.

WINNIPEG, July 28—The possibility of a stalemate in the battle for control of Manitoba's Legislature loomed tonight as returning officers and expert calculators continued the slow process of tabulating votes cast in yesterday's provincial general election.

After being in power 14 years, Premier John Bracken, leader of the Liberal-Progressive party, saw Conservatives and Social Credit candidates win nine seats formerly held by his followers. His party was assured of 18 seats in the 55-member Legislature as counting proceeded tonight, and was leading in six others.

## Il Duce 53 Today

ROME, July 28—Premier Mussolini, to all outward appearances forgetting his 53rd birthday falls tomorrow, continued deeply engrossed today in the affairs of state he has been conducting as premier for almost 15 years.

Anniversary congratulations were discreetly forgotten by the men who surrounded Il Duce at his work.

If a family reunion is planned it was carefully kept out of the press.

Mussolini, the Fascist attitude proclaims, is ageless. He himself has made "youth" the theme song of Italian politics. "Giovinezza" (youth) is the Fascist hymn played or sung after the royal march on all state occasions.

Hence, national alliance marks an event which adds another year to the life of a man whose own dates must keep him perpetually young.

## REBEL GENERAL GIVES PLANS FOR CONQUEST

### Will Drive Wedge Between Irun and San Sebastian and Separate Barcelona and Madrid.

VERA, Spain, rebel headquarters in Navarre, July 28—General Emilio Mola, rebel army leader, at Burgos said today the rebels planned a concerted drive by northern and southern armies to separate Barcelona and Madrid.

General Mola stated the leftist government's strong point was the cooperation between the capital and Barcelona.

The rebel general said success of such a drive "would mean the fall of Madrid." He added "once Madrid is in our hands we can take out time with Catalonia."

Rebels in Vera scoffed at reports from the French side of the frontier that leftist troops had defeated rebels at Oyarzun, near San Sebastian, saying "that was a mere squabble between advance guards."

Rebel officers contended around 1,000 reinforcements were sent from Pamplona in trucks and drove leftist advance guards out of town.

The rebels declared they planned "to break the futile resistance" of government leftist forces near the French frontier by driving a wedge between Irun and San Sebastian toward Bilbao.

Rebel leaders in Vera and Burgos said the Madrid Government controlled the Madrid area with a link to the loyal eastern coast of Spain and Catalonia, where the rebel stronghold of Zaragoza faced the attack of loyalist armies.

The rebels said the northern strip between Burgos and Irun, in the section where leftist troops were fighting with their backs to the wall, surrender was only a matter of time.

## Pictou United Church Burned To Ground

PICTOU, N. S., July 28—(CP)—The Pictou United Church was burned to the ground today by a fire that threatened for a time to destroy a large section of the town.

Roofs of at least a dozen buildings caught from sparks and burning shingles during the fire that razed the church, gutted the home of Ashton Munro and burned two barns to the ground. A high wind carried sparks almost a mile to set fire to one barn.

The flames started in a small barn at the rear of the United Church and were fanned by a strong southerly wind and burning embers caught on the county court house, the jail, the homes of E. Malcolm MacDonald, D. R. Sutherland, R.D. Waters, the garages of Mrs. C.O.H. Webster, G. B. MacLaren and other buildings.

## Instructions To Insurgents

MADRID, July 28—(CP-Havas)—All Madrid newspapers today displayed the text of alleged instructions to the insurgent troops issued by the high command which planned the uprising.

Women were to be shot down without mercy, summary executions of all suspects were to be ordered, and a reign of terror designed to "show the public what we will do if any revolt is organized against us," was arranged according to the published version.

Instructions to destroy the homes, crops and herds of all farmers loyal to the People's Front government also were included in the order-sheet, which stressed the importance of "moral annihilation" as an object of the revolt.

## War Correspondent Shot And Killed

RABAT, French Morocco, July 28—Guy Mazieres, flying war correspondent for the Paris Journal Canard, was shot down and killed by rebel anti-aircraft guns while observing the Spanish Morocco war zone, according to an unconfirmed dispatch from Tangier received here today.

## Rebels Driven Out Of Oyarzun Is Report

HENDAYE, France, July 28.—Spanish refugees reaching here tonight reported Loyalist forces had driven rebel troops out of Oyarzun after heavy fighting.

Surrender of the rebel garrison at Loyola earlier today, permitted the popular front forces to attack Oyarzun, near San Sebastian, the refugees said.

They asserted the rebels abandoned the village late in the afternoon. Rebel troops, reported cut off from retreat to Navarre, marched toward Ventas near Irun. There they met militia of the popular front about six p. m.

Sounds of the battle could be heard here. Machine guns spat fire until seven p. m., when Loyalists said rebels fled the mountains around the Blassosa River.

Reports of the battles were supported by Loyalists from San Sebastian. They said they were given supplies of arms and ammunition, taken from the Loyola barracks when rebels surrendered.

## Purchases Boars From Ont. Farmers

## 1,000 Ethiopians Killed And Wounded

ADDIS ABABA, July 28—(AP)—An Italian communiqué said today 1,000 Ethiopians were killed and wounded in an unsuccessful attempt to cut the Addis Ababa-Dessale motor highway.

The Ethiopians were reported led by Dedjazmach Abarra, son of Ras Kassa, military leader during the Italo-Ethiopian war.

## C.N.R. Engineer Killed When Train Derailed

SHERBROOKE, Que., July 28—Hugh Gauthier, 55, Canadian National Railways engineer was killed today when the Montreal-bound passenger train from Fortland, Que., about 30 miles north-west of here.

The locomotive and baggage car toppled from the rails. Two of the 70 passengers on the train were slightly injured. They suffered chiefly from shock.

The derailment occurred 4.36 p. m. A.D.T. a short distance from the station in South Durham. The fireman was thrown from the engine as it left the rails but escaped unhurt.

## POLICE RAID "FASCIST" HEADQUARTERS

PARIS, July 28—Police thrust anew tonight at rightist opponents of Premier Blum's leftist government.

Operating in absolute secrecy, police began a series of raids on headquarters of dissolved "Fascist" leagues and offices of rightist groups.

Officials announced they were investigating charges of reorganization of the leagues, and said a number of searches were made during the morning and afternoon by judicial police. Squads moved first against the anti-Soviet rallying committee.

## Mobilization Of Conscript Classes Ordered By Govt.

### Loyal Forces Prepare For Onslaught On Cordoba & Zaragoza — Surrender Of Seville Predicted.

MADRID, July 28—Leftist Spanish authorities, rallying national resources to the defence of the republic, today decreed full enforcement of Article 26 of the constitution and ordered all buildings belonging to religious orders and the Catholic Church in general confiscated within five days.

MADRID, July 28—(C.P.-Havas)—With loyal forces hammering at Oviedo and preparing for a crushing onslaught on Zaragoza and Cordoba, the government rallied its strength for a death blow at the revolt tonight by ordering immediate mobilization of the 1914 and 1915 conscript classes in several provinces.

Confiscation of all buildings belonging to religious orders within five days was ordered, while two credits totalling 40,000,000 pesetas (\$5,480,000) were allotted as emergency funds to meet the government's new obligations.

An army of Asturian miners, encircling Oviedo under the command of Gonzales Pena, has stormed the northern city, the government announced.

Reports from the south and the Mediterranean area indicated loyal leftists and insurgent Fascists were locked in a fight to the finish.

Gen. Miaja's loyal troops were near Cordoba in the southwest, the Interior Ministry announced. Gen. Queipo de Llano's immediate defeat or surrender in Seville was predicted, the government claiming the rebel commander's position was increasingly untenable as Leftists in the surrounding cities rallied to government columns.

One of the few discouraging notes here was the denial of yesterday's report that the Alcazar fortress at Toledo had been recaptured by government troops.

The government fathered its resources for a smashing attack at dawn against rebel forces holding the Somosierra Mountains, 60 miles north of the capital. Massed at Bultrago, 20 miles south of Somosierra, government forces moved up to their assigned positions under cover of darkness.

Ten thousand loyalists from Barcelona were reported surrounding Zaragoza. Other thousands of government troops and People's Front militia were battering at the gates of Seville, in the southwest.

Progress of the rebel advance on Malaga in the extreme south, where loyalists were holding out against rebel Morocco legionaries, was not made known in Madrid.

The leftist government announced that both San Sebastian and Loyola had been taken from the insurgents after bitter fighting, and that the whole of the northern coast once more was under its control.

## Brit. Constable Killed In Battle With Arabs

JERUSALEM, July 28—Arab terrorists, 20 of their number reported slain, re-attacked into the hills of Nablus tonight before British infantry and airplanes.

Christopher Wren, British constable, was killed in the fighting which marked the severest battle since beginning 101 days ago of the Arab general strike against Jewish immigration.

More than 200 Arabs were in the band which gained in numbers as fighting progressed higher into the hills with their almost impregnable hiding places.

Only a small number comprised the band which engaged police in the initial brush today in which Constable Wren was killed. Three Arabs were killed in this thrust.

When troops, with tanks and armored cars, entered the fray the Arabs retreated slowly and their force increased. British planes, spraying the counter attack, dropped bombs and hand grenades, and firing machine gun fire on the caves in which Arabs took refuge.

## Seven Killed In B. And O. Train Derailment

CLAY CITY, Ill., July 28—At least seven persons were killed today when a Baltimore and Ohio freight train derailed here. Two were members of the crew, the others were transients.

Rescuers were told by one of the transients who was not hurt that he knew of a dozen men and boys riding in one of the 14 overturned cars who had not been accounted for.

The identified dead were: Wayne Caldwell, head brakeman, Washington, Ind.; Robert May, student fireman, Washington, Ind.; Fletcher Arcold, Newport News, Va.; transient; L. H. McNeill, negro transient, Alexander City, Ala.

Other crew members were uninjured. A split switch was believed to have caused the wreck. Traffic was rerouted while wrecking crews proceeded to the scene to clear the right of way.
