NEW YORK (AP)—Rails, air lines and American Telephone's new split stock were packmakers as the stock market made its best gain in a month since Wednesday. Trading was moderate.

Ford and Chrysler were linked to further mulling over of the prospect of an auto strike and concern over effects of the intra-union dispute which has stopped new car deliveries on the East Coast.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—Traders were mostly lower as stocks were at its lowest price in more than two months on the stock market week Wednesday.
Volume was 3,703,000 compared with 4,608,000 shares Tuesday, followed since March 11 when 3,687,000 shares changed hands.
Of the 609 issues traded, 148 advanced while only 189 advanced.
Industrials were lower. Canadian Packers 5 clipped 1/2 to 7 1/2, Chrysler 1/10 to 52 1/2 and CPR trading ex-dividend 11-1/8 to 64 1/2.
Lack of volume was attributed by brokers to the lack of wide interest in speculative mining issues and the fact the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges were closed for St. Jean Baptiste Day.
Consolidated Bathwell dipped 1/2 cent to 27 1/2.
Bunker Hill continued its slow recovery with a one cent loss to 22 1/2.
Gold stocks were weaker. Hollinger dipped -1/2 to 27 1/2.
Senior issue market was dull. Hudson Bay and Noranda advanced 1/4 each to 63 1/2 and 45 1/2 respectively. There was a 1/2 cent gain in 1/2 to 55 1/2.
On index, Industrials were down 4 1/2 to 156.20, commodities 1.62-28 and the exchange index 34 to 145.57. Base metals index up 21 to 65.50 and western oil 32 to 38.35.
