Casualties Among Local Parking Meters

A recent inspection of all the parking meters in the City made by the Chief of Police, in company with the members of the police committee and Hawley Crockett, reveals that out of 428 units, there are 128 not in satisfactory working condition. These have been taken in and will be repaired. Chief MacArthur states that many of the damaged meters show evidence of having been backed into by cars or trucks. He advises that it is a traffic offence to back into a metered area, and that future violations of this nature will be closely checked by officers on patrol.

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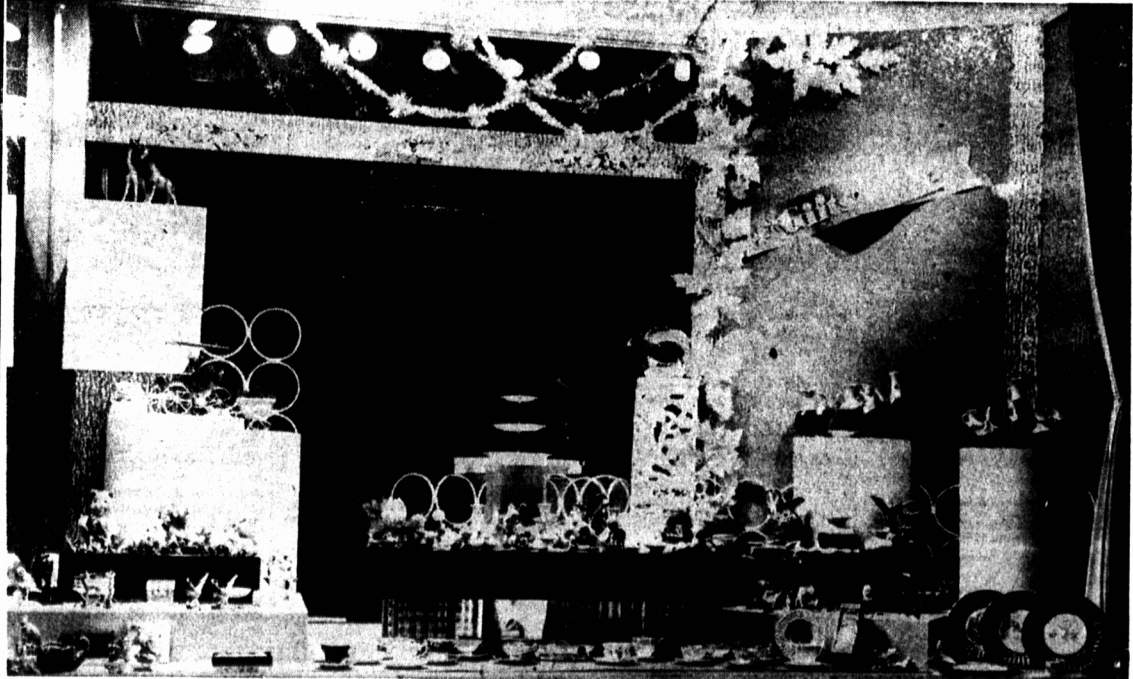
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
