That more garbage containers should be provided in both Charlottetown and Summerside. That more interest should be shown in promotion of a Civic Centre in Charlottetown as it is needed not only for a market, but also as a centre for art, museum, drama and all cultural presentations.

That a Brief should be presented to the Provincial Government re adopting a demerit system for traffic offenders, as well as regulations set up re under age drivers of tractors on our roads.

That Business and Professional Clubs go on record stressing the need for an additional car ferry.

That women should be called to jury duty to act along with men, particularly in the case of a woman on trial.

That the tea table was presided over by Miss Love and those seated at it were the Provincial Officers of the B. and P. Clubs, Club Presidents and Senator Inman.

Letters and congratulatory telegrams from National Officers were read by Miss Hilda Harper after which Mrs. R. E. Sutherland introduced Miss Barbara Rogers who sang two very delightful solos.

Mrs. Helen Dunbar, retiring Provincial President, after reading her report, was presented with a Past President's pin by Miss Helen Yeo.

Mrs. Amy Rogers introduced Senator Elsie Inman who gave a most interesting informal talk on the Senate and its functions, of the visit to Ottawa of Her Majesty, the Queen.

She also spoke briefly of the opening of Canada House in New York City which she attended, and meetings at the United Nations.

Expect Broadcast Governors To Be Appointed This Week

OTTAWA (CP) — Appointment of at least the key personnel on the new Board of Broadcast Governors is expected to be announced this week, government informants say.

Mr. Stewart was a member of the three-man royal commission on broadcasting whose report in 1957 formed the basis for legislation passed at the last session of Parliament—but not yet proclaimed—that provided the changes in Canadian broadcasting.

It is understood the government may appoint immediately the three full-time members of the board and some, if not all, of the 12 part-time governors.

The board would assume the regulatory powers over broadcasting that the CBC board of governors now holds.

This new setup calls for a re-vamping of the CBC board, but it is possible this job—involving the appointment of a CBC president and vice-president and nine part-time directors—will be delayed for a short time.

Many names proposed. Scores of other names have been submitted for various appointments to the BBG and they are being kept confidential.

If all of the 12 part-time members of the BBG are not appointed at one time, at least six would have to be named to give the board enough members for the required quorum of nine.

Informants believe that the necessity for quick action on the establishment of the BBG is not the same where the new CBC board of directors is concerned.

It is understood that the CBC could continue its operations for a time without the new board.

Eventually, however, the 11 CBC appointments, including the full-time president and vice-president, would have to be filled.

It is generally conceded that J. A. Quimet, 50, general manager of the CBC, and Ernest Bushnell, 57, assistant general manager, are the likely government choices for the posts of CBC president and vice-president, respectively.

BOSS BILL COLLECTOR

MOSCOW — (AP) — Premier Khrushchev, touring Soviet farm areas, Friday reminded collective farmers of a bill they owed the government. He said farmers should take advantage of their good crops to pay for the tractors they bought after he abolished state run farm machine stations. So far, Khrushchev said, farmers had paid only 21,500,000 rubles toward farm machinery that is worth 391,000,000 rubles.

FERRY JETS OVERSEAS

OTTAWA (CP) — Fifteen CF-100 jet interceptors will leave here Wednesday on a ferry flight to the RCAF Air Division in Europe, air force headquarters announced Friday. The operation known as Jump Moat 5 will be under command of Sqdn. Ldr. M. J. Doohar, 34, of Ottawa.
