

Swims 5 4 6 8 in Soccer Pool Contest at London

LONDON (Reuters)—The nation Tuesday shared the joy of a 14-year-old widow who won £200,235 in a weekly soccer pool contest.

Mrs. Nellie McGrath and her two young daughters, who live in London and tried on new dresses in a swank bath for the cheque presentation ceremony.

Her jackpot—£125,000—is the highest ever paid out in the weekly soccer pools, which net two pence (2½ cents).

"I am sure I shall be happier now," Mrs. McGrath said after her £125,000 prize.

Early this year her husband died of injuries suffered in a traffic accident three years ago. The two-year-old widow received £315 in settlement.

Of the 17,000,000 Britons—one-third of the population—who bet on the soccer pools each week, Nellie Jackson is a dream come true.

The hopefuls each week bet anything from a penny up to £10 on the pools.

Soccer games played each Saturday from August to April.

Big match offers out-competition to bet on combinations of home wins, away-from-home wins, ties, and so on.

MILLIONS BET—Last year £3,000,000 net total on lady luck—£71,000,000 of it on the weekly pools. Some £300,000,000 was bet on horse racing. £121,000,000 on greyhound racing and £500,000,000 on the forms of legal gambling.

Mrs. McGrath won her prize by correctly forecasting eight soccer games which ended in a tie last Saturday. A 1,217,368-1/2 to one chance.

She spent one shilling 6p when she bet on her first pool last week with nine forecasts at two to one a chance.

Mrs. McGrath won a second prize and seven third prizes for her total investment. These prizes net her a few thousand pounds more.

But her forecast of eight tie games cost her £10,000,000. The previous highest prize ever won in the Littlewood's contest was £104,000.

Mound Accused NHL President

NEW YORK (CP)—Milton Mound, president of the National Hockey League Players Association, Tuesday accused the Toronto Maple Leafs manager and NHL President Clarence Campbell of "unfair labor practices" and "holding the players up."

Mound said, referring to a private meeting Monday between the players' Campbell and Maple Leaf manager, and staffed Smythe, team's executive chairman of the Leafs' hockey committee.

"It's embarrassing to see three young, mature adults trying to intimidate these young boys," Mound said.

"But we've got to get the clubs to agree on a minimum salary, and on working conditions, and on the application of television revenue. Some of it should be used for players' pensions and other benefits."

Mound said he had filed certification applications for the New York, Boston, Detroit and Chicago clubs with the National Labor Relations Board here and is drafting an application for the Montreal Canadiens.

Ted Meredith Buried Today

RADDONFIELD, N. J. (AP)—Funeral services will be conducted today for James E. (Ted) Meredith, 64, former holder of the world track records for 400 yards, 800 meters and the half mile.

Meredith, an all-time, top great, suffered a stroke last March that left him partly paralyzed. He fell and out of a fevered a broken hip. He underwent surgery in hospital at Camden, N. J., and died in Stockholm.

As a school boy, he won the 800-meter run in the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm.

In 1918, as a Penn student, he lowered the 800 standard to 1:52.1 and the 400 record to 47.4 seconds. He later became assistant track coach at Penn and in 1938 coached the Czechoslovakian Olympic 400 m track team. After his return from the Olympics he took a job with the U.S. internal revenue service.
