SENT UP.—This morning Terrence Mc-
Attee and Richard and Charles Thorne,
were arraigned before R. R. Fitzgerald, J.
P., on complaint of W. W. Wellner,
charged with malicious injuries to property.
After hearing the evidence of several wit-
nesses, the Magistrate sent all three up for
trial in the Supreme Court. The penalty
for such an offence, when the amount of
damage exceeds twenty dollars, is impris-
onment for five years and a fine of \$500.
The damage in the Wellner case is said to
amount to about \$70.

TALMAGE'S NEW TABERNACLE.—Rev. T.
Talmage's new Tabernacle at Brook-
lyn, N. Y., was opened to his congregation
and the public for the first time on Sunday
morning. Three imposing dedicatory services
were held during the day, and thousands of
people crowded the big edifice at each one.
The Tabernacle's dimensions are 200 feet long
and 118 wide. It is Romanesque in style of
architecture, and is brick and stone. The
church will seat 5,500 persons. The big or-
gan cost \$30,000. Up to date the total cost
of the church has been \$410,000, and it will
require \$40,000 more to complete it.

QUICK AND SATISFACTORY PASSAGE.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 28.—The steam-
ship Empress of India arrived off Victoria
this morning at 6:30, after a passage of ten
days, fourteen hours and thirty-six minutes,
beating the best previous records by over
three days. She encountered a strong gale
on the 26th inst., and a cyclone gale on the
26th, which reduced her speed. Gale,
strong winds and heavy seas were encoun-
tered during most of the passage. The
Empress of India has 13 first-class passeng-
ers and 355 Chinese. Among the passengers
are Sir John Gladstone, Mr. and Mrs.
Power, of Dublin, and others. Upon the
steamer's arrival here she was met by the
mayor and council, on behalf of the citizens
of Victoria. Mayor Grant presented the
Captain and officers with a handsome silver
punch bowl.

The Newfoundland Trouble.

LONDON, April 28.—The Times comment-
ing on the debate on the Newfoundland
bill in the House of Lords, says: "It
must be admitted that the Earl of Kimberley
found peace in the Government's case.
Lord Salisbury's rejoinder that it would
not have been proper to submit the bill to
colonial discussion before it was produced
in the Imperial Parliament was not an
adequate answer. It seems a pity that the
colonists should have been kept ignorant
of the proposed bill when they were com-
mitting themselves by impracticable reasons
from which they now appear to be desirous
of receding."
The Chronicle asks if "it is too late to
give Newfoundland an opportunity for ex-
cusing its pledge without branding the
pledge as lacking good faith." "Every-
thing," says the Chronicle, "depends upon
the time because the colonial legisla-
tion must be enacted within 10 days, while
Imperial legislation may be delayed until
after Whitsuntide."

The London Standard says there is little
likelihood that Lord Knutsford's bill will
ever become law in any shape or form.
Ample time will be given to the coloni-
al legislature for consideration before the
measure will be brought before the House
of Commons.

Flashes From the Wires.

BERLIN, April 28.—The funeral services
over the remains of Count Von Moltke took
place to-day. Emperor William, the king
of Saxony, members of royal families, together
with the leading German generals were
present.

NEW YORK, April 28.—A telegram from
Valparaiso says the suppression of the rebel-
lion is looked for at an early day. The rebels
are said to have no force of any importance
on hand.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Attorney-General
Miller has not yet received the report of
Attorney-General Grant at New Orleans with
regard to the killing of the Italians in parish
prison there. The only information he has
about the matter is what is contained in the
newspapers.
