Higher Educational Conference At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—An impressive array of leaders in learning and knowledge meets here next week to consider the problems facing higher education in Canada. The central problem appears to be money.

University enrolments may be almost double their present size in about 10 years. Some \$285,000,000—a conservative estimate—will be needed simply to provide physical facilities for the expansion.

Responsible educationists say an improvement in the quality of university training is at least equally important as providing for more students; standards must not be submerged in the influx of undergraduates. And the economic position of university is little or no better than it was in 1939.

Those are some of the major factors behind the three-day meeting, starting Monday, which was called by the National Conference of Canadian Universities.

The importance of the subject has been recognized by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, which is giving financial support for the forum discussions.

ALL SCHOOLS ATTEND
The president or principal of nearly every university in Canada will be present in many cases. The universities also are sending deans of faculties.

The issue of university finances has been assigned the entire study session of the closing day. And on Monday evening Prime Minister St. Laurent will speak at a conference dinner.

Demand Russians Leave Hungary

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—Yugoslavia, the first Communist bloc country to bolt from the Soviet satellite set-up, Thursday joined a demand in the United Nations General Assembly that Russian troops pull out of Hungary.

However, the Yugoslavian delegate would not go so far as to support the non-Communist demand for a UN investigation of the Hungarian situation.

Instead, Jozsef Brilej told the 76-nation assembly that all outsiders should keep out of Hungarian affairs.

He spoke as speaker after speaker accused the Russians of putting down the Hungarian rebellion and installing the puppet regime of Premier Janos Kadar.

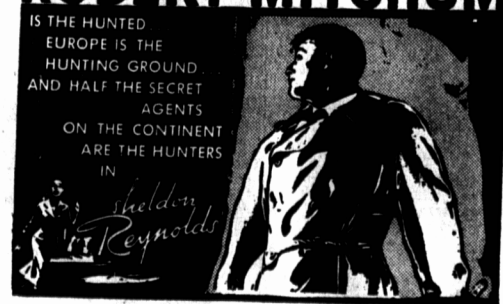

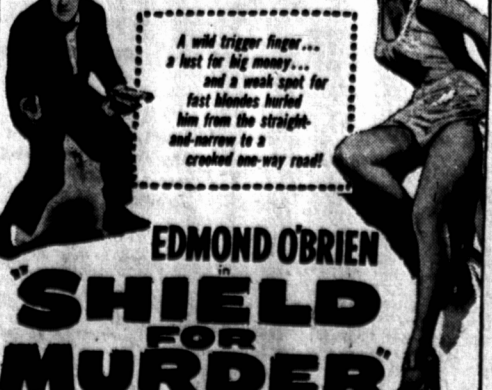

Legion Urges National Selective Service System

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Legion told the government today that recent events in Hungary and the Middle East support its demand for national selective service based on a system of national registration.

In a brief submitted to cabinet the Legion said it is "unrealistic and dangerous" for Canada to be the only NATO country, except Iceland, without a system of national selective service.

The 25-page brief, presented annually on the eve of Remem-

brance Day, asked cabinet to consider the extreme seriousness of the West's position had recent uprisings and revolts occurred in East Germany instead of Hungary and Poland.
