

THE PROVINCIAL ALLIANCE.

Important Resolutions Adopted—Officers Elected:

The annual meeting of the Provincial Alliance was held in Kindergarten Hall on Thursday. The proceedings began at 2.15, with the appointing of committees. The following resolutions were then submitted by the committee on resolutions (D. Schurman, J. Anderson and S. M. Martin):

1st—Resolved, That total national prohibition is the most effectual remedy for the drink traffic, and the ultimate goal of all our temperance legislation.

2nd—We entirely disapprove of the legal protection being given to the traffic by any license law; or of any private gain or public revenue being derived from a system so utterly wrong in principle, suicidal in policy, and disastrous in results.

3rd—Resolved That pending the passing of a general prohibitory law we urge upon our Federal Parliament the granting to the several provinces which gave a majority vote in favor of prohibition by the recent plebiscite the largest possible degree of prohibition.

4th—Resolved, That we demand the repeal of the law granting licenses for the sale of liquors in the city of Charlotte town.

5th—Resolved, That we urge the enactment of such a law as shall prohibit the sale of liquors in the city of Charlotte town.

6th—Resolved, That we rejoice with the citizens of Summerside in the fact that they have succeeded in electing a Town Council who are in sympathy with and determined to enforce the C. T. A., and we congratulate them on securing the services of so efficient a prosecutor as D. W. Henderson has proven himself to be.

7th—Resolved, That we believe for the better enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act it is indispensable that the salaries of the prosecutors should be increased, and that the law should be carried out in accordance with its spirit, and not used as an engine for raising revenue.

After an interesting discussion the resolutions were unanimously adopted, and the Executive Committee was instructed to bring the same to the notice of the members of Parliament.

Mr. Anderson, the new President, then thanked the Alliance for the honor done him, and assured all that he would do everything in his power to promote the interests of the temperance cause.

After appointing a committee to arrange for speakers for the Y. M. C. A. gospel meetings, and the singing of the National Anthem the meeting adjourned.

In the evening a public meeting was held, at which addresses befitting the occasion were delivered by President Anderson, Rev. J. W. McConnell, Rev. R. F. Whiston, Mr. D. W. Henderson, Mr. W. H. Bears, Mr. R. H. MacDonald, Mr. S. M. Martin and Rev. Mr. Raymond in the order named.

A collection was taken up to defray expenses.

The National Anthem closed the proceedings.

THE OFFICE OF ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

DEAR SIR,—The public fully expected that the 1st of June would be called to meet in April. But now it appears the men who presume to have the confidence of the people have still further removed from our view the prospects of an early session. It is equally a matter of surprise how the Attorney-General can exercise the functions of his office. Before the introduction of responsible Government, I believe it was not necessary to have that official on the membership of either branch of the Legislature; but after that date the subject was fully discussed in the Provincial Assembly of this province—an address to the Queen was adopted—the House recommended that the Attorney-General and three others should be selected from the lower branch of the Legislature, such members being responsible to the House for the acts of the Administrator of the Government.

I believe that the practice in the British Parliament is that the Attorney-General is appointed by letters patent during pleasure—nominated by the Prime Minister from either branch after consultation with the Lord Chancellor. Our Attorney-General was chosen and then looked to the people for confirmation of his appointment. The people did not confirm his appointment. By what means, then, can he continue to discharge the duties of his office? If he can, I presume he could take his seat in the Assembly within the bar of the House.

There was a rule in 1788 which has ever since been observed, that the Attorney-General, if not honorable by birth shall have the dignity of knighthood conferred upon him, also Q. C., in order that when he retires from office he may not be reduced to the ranks.

It is, however, a serious matter if we have no constitutional or legal Attorney-General. If bribery and treating is carried on at elections contrary to the spirit and intent of law, if resignations can be filched from members under false pretences, if the will of the people can be thwarted by bribery and members spirited away, where is the Attorney-General to prosecute? His letters patent may disappear and the country has no redress. This, of course, coupled with the fact that the present party is holding on to power when the people have declared openly against them at the polls.

Mr. Editor, if you can enlighten us on the law respecting the necessity of the Attorney-General being chosen from the Legislative Assembly you will confer a favor upon your readers who desire information on the subject.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Globe remarks that "when Mr. Carnegie, the philanthropist, capitalized the steel industry he founded for \$200,000,000, he showed an abiding faith in the cash value of the protective tariff."

It is remarked by the Montreal Gazette that he probably wants to repeat the White-Vince business, and make sure that nothing is going to a Conservative that a Liberal wants. That is the size of Dr. Borden by his own measurement.
