**SONS OF ENGLAND.**

**Grand Concert in the Opera House.**

The Charlottetown Lodges of the Sons of England are to be congratulated upon the large measure of success which attended their Natal Day concert in the Opera House last evening. The Opera House was thronged, and every number on the excellent programme was rendered in a manner which drew forth generous applause. The hall and stage was artistically decorated with flags and bunting, and presented a most attractive appearance. The concert was in aid of the Red Cross Society, and a snug sum must have been realized.

Promptly at eight o'clock the first number on the programme, a march by Professor Vinnicombe's orchestra, was called, and the manner in which it was played led the audience to expect that the other selections by this talented aggregation of musicians would be of the most pleasing character. That their expectation in this regard was fully sustained was demonstrated by the applause which followed the several numbers.

The sword drill by a number of young ladies was a feature that greatly pleased the audience; and the gypsy scene and dance by the same young ladies captivated everyone.

Several excellent choruses were given under the direction of Professor Watts, many of the best voices of the city participating. There were also two capital choruses by the members of the Sons of England, a well arranged military camp scene accompanying the last one.

Vocal solos were contributed by Mrs. Watts, Mrs. E. H. Norton, Miss Florence Earle, and Mr. E. H. Mitchell. All are favorites with Charlottetown concert-goers, and each sang well. Mr. Mitchell was dressed in khaki and carried a gun. His selection was entitled "The Uncommercial Traveler," and dealt with the exploits of Mr. Thomas Atkins. The refrain was taken up by the ladies and gentlemen of the chorus who were seated in the boxes and in the body of the hall.

"After the Sun Went Down," a duet by the two little daughters of Mr. W. F. Gill, of the Post Office Department, delighted the audience. In response to an encore the little ones gave a doll song in a very pleasing manner.

The patriotic readings by Miss Enid McLean and Miss Flo Mackenzie were well given, and greatly appreciated.

Professor Watts acted as musical director, Lieut. A. G. Peake arranged the tableaux, and the gypsy scene was the work of Miss Helena Macdonald.

The National Anthem was sung twice during the evening, the audience joining in the singing. It was first sung after one of the earlier choruses and again at the close of the entertainment.
