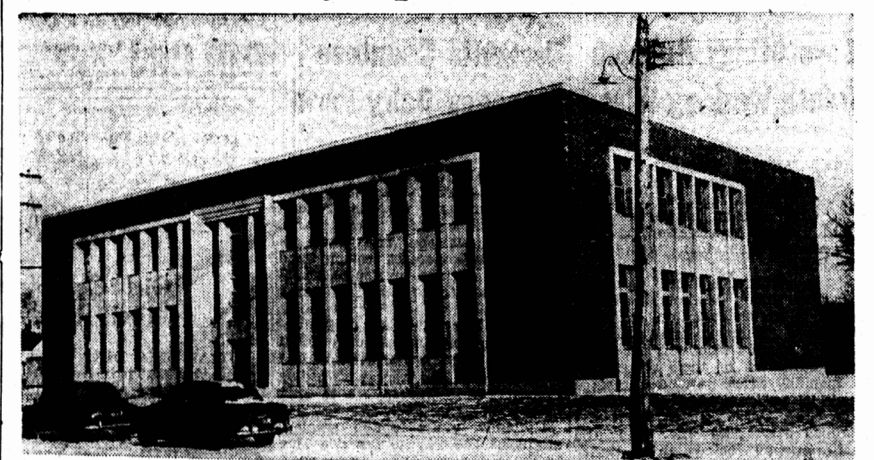
U. S. Plans To Expand Atomic Energy Program

No Details Of Revised Plans Are Revealed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—President Truman has decided to recommend an expansion of the United States atomic program, Senator Brien McMahon (Dem. Conn.) said today.

McMahon, talking with reporters after a talk with Truman at the White House, did not give details. He is chairman of the Senate-house of representatives atomic energy committee.

The move, aimed at saving the British-led sterling area's trade and monetary system from collapse, will spread austerity to most of the Commonwealth's 500,000,000 citizens.
