The 77-year-old manager of Moore, the light heavyweight champion, said this would be the battle of the century. It would draw at least \$3,000,000—maybe even \$5,000,000 counting everything.

Kearns said he had two monied Canadian groups and one in California ready to back him all the way and at any possible site.

TODAY MARKS the end of a great week of racing at Charlottetown Driving Park.

If the weatherman continues to behave it will mean that nine programs will have been run off by midnight tonight. That would mean 72 dashes of racing jammed into five days.

Originally eleven cards were lined up for the Old Home week celebration but rain sent two of them down the drain on Tuesday. However since that day the weather has been excellent and everything has gone on as scheduled.

THE DIRECTORS certainly should have no kick at losing one day from the race program this year. In 1956, 1957 and 1958 programs were advertised and 32 were run off in their entirety. The other program saw three dashes finished before the rain wiped out the remainder of the card. That definitely is better than average treatment as far as weather is concerned.

It's true that some of the programs came near being washed out but the showers came at the most appropriate times and allowed things to be completed. If today continues like Friday, the percentage of 9 out of 11 for 1959 is certainly nothing to growl about.

WE GLANCED back on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday programs and found that mainland horses put up an excellent showing against the homesters. With Island horses outnumbering the visitors 4 to 1, the trotters and pacers from across the strait have won 17 out of the 40 dashes raced. Rainbow Clegg, Dominator Pick, The Colonel C., Hamilton Lady and Gilda all have captured two dashes each and Leah's Girl, Red's King, Inelaud Duke, Long Dan, Connie French, Bothwell, Cruiser have managed single triumphs.

Horses have been grabbing new race records on every program and those who have not had an opportunity to perform on the local speedway before this year are finding the racing strip tough to their liking.

Race secretary Frank Acorn has done an exceptionally fine job so far on the classifying and there's no doubt that "Duck" will continue his good work right through the piece.

A week such as we have had takes loads of planning. These things just don't happen and those responsible are deserving of congratulations.

ONE OF THE BUSIEST PERSONS at the raceway all this week is Mrs. Ida Yeo, the efficient and genial clerk of the course. She has everything at her fingertips and nothing escapes her eye. The local driving park is fortunate in having a lady of her capabilities looking after this most important post.

TIME APPARENTLY has caught up with Stan Musial, great first sacker of the St. Louis Cardinals.

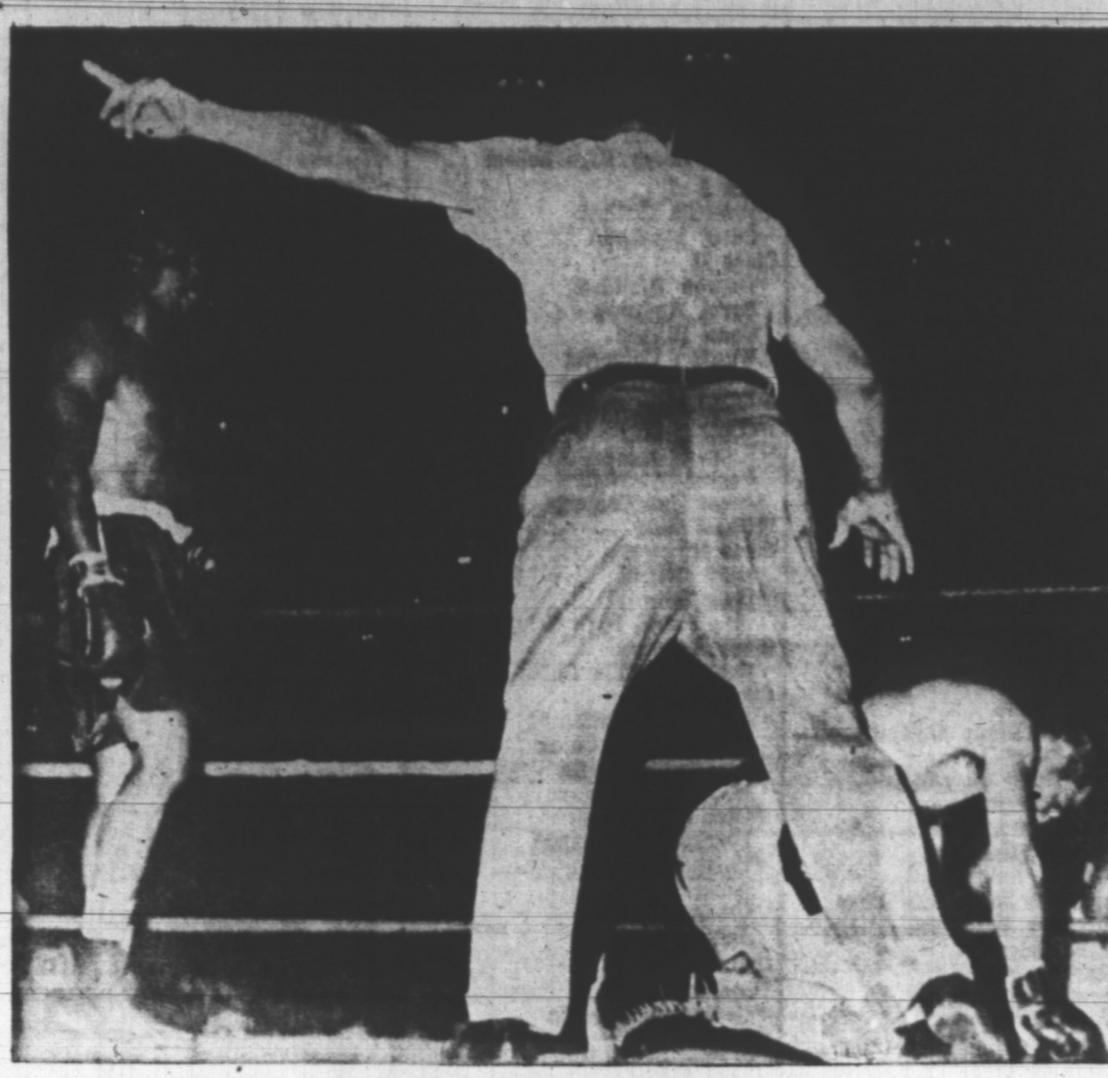

Lucky holders of the quinnella picked up \$62.20 and the second daily double on a combination ticket of Lilly's Pointer and Nellie J. were rewarded with the handsome of \$51.20. The exactor in the final dash returned \$51.40.

Jolity Hal and Lilly's Pointer topped twin victories. Jolity Hal, owned by J.E. Bernard of Hunter River, captured both heats of the D Pace in 2:15-3 and 2:17. Lilly's Pointer, 6-year-old brown mare owned and driven by H.B. Willis of Charlottetown, emerged the victor in the second and sixth dashes.

The other winners were: Double Smart, Nellie J. Leah's Girl and Vera Signal.

Highlight of the evening was the feature free for all, which saw Mighty Lee, the MacDonald-MacLaine owned 6-year-old roan gelding come through with twin wins in 2:06-2 and 2:05-3.

Fancy Queen, the chestnut mare with a tab of 2:02-3 which has been the subject of discussion over the past week, finished fifth both trips.

The six year old mare, just recently acquired by Harry Hirsch of Sydney, was expected by many to give Mighty Lee a go in this feature event. The mare, however, had just completed a gruelling 5-day trip by trailer, arriving here Thursday, and wasn't at her peak last evening.

Rainbow Clegg was second to Mighty Lee in the first dash of the free-for-all, and Sir Joseph

was a close second in the second dash.

Sir Joseph, having one of his best seasons since coming to Prince Edward Island several years ago, looked real good in both dashes. In the first heat the 11-year-old bay gelding took the field to the first quarter in 30.2.

The four-year-old black horse Jackie Jackson was at his best last night, capturing both heats of the junior-free-for-all.

The young horse, owned by R. J. Logue of Sydney, went the first trip in 2:10 flat and on his second time out, dusted the oval in 2:09-3.

Musial Predicts Comeback For Casey Stengel In 1960

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Stan (The Man) Musial, benched for the rest of the season, was holding court near the locker where uniform No. 6 hung.

"Casey Stengel says he's going to make a comeback in '60," Stan said. "I'm predicting a comeback. I wonder what's keeping Ted Williams."

It's been a bad year for baseball's two top players of the last 20 years and for the perennial title-winning manager of the New York Yankees.

But Musial for one is confident he will do better next season.

"I feel this has just been a bad year, not one in which old age caught up with me," Stan said. "It's a mechanical problem. I'm doing something wrong at the plate."

St. Louis Cardinals announced before Thursday night's game with Los Angeles that Musial would see only occasional pinch-hitting duty or perhaps get a starting assignment now and then, so that young players could be tested.

General manager Bing Devine said the club made this decision to bury persistent rumors that Musial would quit after this year. Some believe the announcement only added kindling to the rumors.

Musial's batting average is .361. He has only 11 homers, but this is second-best on the club—a good indication of the team's power shortage.

Musial wince when reminded he once said he would quit if he couldn't hit .300.

Kinsmen Nip Legion 10-9

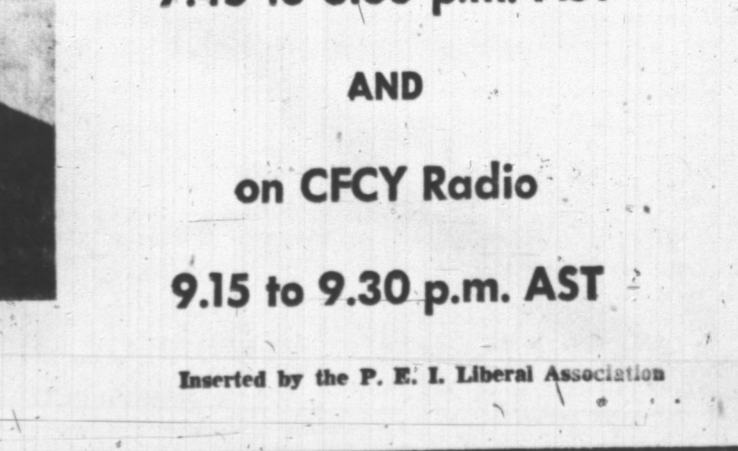
