Mar. College Expands Courses

Maritime Correspondence College is again expanding courses to another Atlantic province. Approval from Dr. G.A. Frecker, Deputy Minister of Education for Newfoundland, has been received to give complete academic courses in Grades IX, X, and XII. Commercial courses will also be carried on as part of the curriculum in Newfoundland.

It is felt that through the present expansion programme, this school will be able to give Newfoundland students the same opportunity in obtaining a high school education as now established in Prince Edward Island. Students in Newfoundland will be allowed to write the Public Examinations and examinations set by the Atlantic Provinces' Examining Board.

Courses in the two phases of training will be offered and new courses will be starting in January in both Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Staff appointments for Newfoundland will be announced at a later date.

Students completing academic courses in either Newfoundland or Prince Edward Island may earn Matriculation standing and enter university providing students write and pass the proper examinations. The past term has been successful with a large enrollment in both commercial and academic.

Maritime Correspondence College was established in 1953 for the purpose of introducing home study courses and giving the public the opportunity of receiving a high school education.

The Principal is Mr. Arnold L. Hubley, B.A., Director of Commercial Education at Athens District High School, Brockville, Ontario. Mr. Hubley has been Principal of M.C.C. since its organization and formerly taught in Charlottetown.

Canadian Imports Higher This Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian imports increased 10 per cent in value in August and were up 26 per cent for the first eight months of the year, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday.

August imports rose to \$473,600,000 from \$429,800,000 in the corresponding month a year ago and increased to \$3,801,500,000 from \$3,011,900,000 in the January-August period.

Imports in August were larger in value from all main areas, except the United Kingdom. But the gains were general in the year.

Imports from the United States rose to \$329,683,000 in August, bringing the cumulative figure to \$2,788,600,000. This was an increase from \$301,691,000 in August, 1955, and from \$2,225,319,000 in the eight-month period.

Purchases from the U.K. fell to \$42,801,000 from \$45,398,000 in August, but the eight-month total was up sharply to \$327,461,000 from \$261,788,000.

Confirm Dorsey Death Accidental

GREENWICH, Conn. (AP)—Investigators said Wednesday there is no question that handloader Tommy Dorsey died accidentally. Both Police Chief David W. Robbins and Coroner Edgar Krentzman said confusion about notes left in the palatial home where Dorsey was found dead Monday afternoon should not be allowed to lend an aura of mystery to the case.

Dr. C. Stanley Knapp said Dorsey had become ill in his bedroom, had suffered an attack of nausea and had choked to death on food particles which lodged in his throat.
