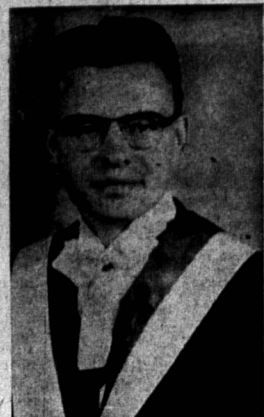
DESMOND CONNOLLY

Milking Records From Crown Pt. Farm, Pownal

"Crown Point Posch's Chieftain" graded very good. A pure bred Holstein cow bred and owned by Cyril Jones, Pownal, has just completed a ten year old record on twice a day milking of 22,375 lbs milk, 825 lbs fat, 3.69 percent test in 365 days. Producing in eight lactations a total of 109,862 lbs milk, 4,030 lbs fat, she qualified for a Red Seal Certificate of Longtime Production.

Her daughter "Crown Point Posch Camay, very good, produced 20,607 lbs milk, 881 lbs fat, 4.28 percent test in 305 days as a six year old on two milkings.

Camay's daughter "Crown Point Colleen" very good, produced in the three year old class 16,323 lbs milk, 675 lbs fat, 3.68 percent test in 365 days, she was milked three times a day for 37 days.

Colleen's paternal sister, "Crown Point Jill", very good, in the four year old class produced 14,072 lbs milk 578 lbs fat, 4.11 percent test in 305 days on two milkings. Jill was ranked champion at Charlottetown Exhibition in 1955 and 1956.

Chieftain is the dam of the Jones present herd sire, "Crown Point Senator Abegweit" very good. His first two daughters in the herd have just completed the following record.

"Crown Point Nancy" a junior two year old, 12,109 lbs milk, 436 lbs fat, 3.60 percent test in 305 days on two milkings.

"C. P. Dream Girl" another daughter of Camay has a junior three year record of 13,943 lbs milk, 529 lbs fat, 3.79 percent test in 365 days on two milkings.

AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Federation of Agriculture members are reminded that Monday, May 6 has been set as the date for the local school district meeting. These meetings concern themselves with the appointment of chairmen and secretaries, with the bringing up to date of membership, with problems of concern to farmers and with the protection program offered by the Federation to its members.

May 6th was picked as a date when it was felt travelling would be reasonably good and when there would be no rush of activity on the land. The meetings are to be held, unless otherwise arranged, at the school and the secretary and chairman are urged to make the necessary arrangements with school officials.

It is hoped that a large number of farmers will make arrangements to set aside the evening of May 6th to meet with their neighbours in strengthening and creating interest in the Federation of Agriculture.

BENEFITS

Far too many farmers ask the question "Why should I support the Federation of Agriculture?" question in the negative. We doubt that there is any farmer in Canada worthy of the name who has not benefited to some extent through the Federation of Agriculture and most of them have enjoyed very considerable benefits.

We do not intend to go back over the years for instances to cite nor do we intend to discuss in a general way the importance and necessity of rural people being organized to develop policy with respect to their own affairs. During the past few months a number of benefits have come to farmers, benefits which were worked on by the Federation of Agriculture. True, the Federation does not claim all the credit in these matters but it is certainly entitled to a share.

We could mention the placing of a tariff on American potatoes, the Federation has been active in this connection and has supported the potato growers quite strongly in their representations, in addition the Federation has worked on a floor price for milk powder, on marketing legislation, on standard time, on having station wagons brought under the Farm Improvement Loans Act, on changes in the Farm Loan Act, on adjustments in income tax procedures, on adjustments in freight assistance on Western grain and on action by the Price Support Board to stabilize the price of eggs in January.
