

Local and Other Items.

TO REPEAL THE SCOTT ACT.—A petition is being circulated asking for an election on the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Westmorland. The act was first carried in Westmorland in 1879 and has been continuously in force ever since. The majority for the act in the last repeal election was about 700.—Moncton Times.

ASSAULTED A PRIEST.—According to a recent despatch from Seattle, Wash., the French Government will demand an indemnity of \$100,000 from the United States for an assault alleged to have been made some weeks ago upon a French Priest Abbe de la Croix de Casties, by two Customs inspectors at Everett, Washington.

IN DISTRESS.—A recent despatch from St. Thomas says: Sch. Glendy Burke, Stanwood, from Prince Edward Island, for Boston with potatoes (before reported), put in here Jan. 21, reported to be leaking and with loss of sails. Her cargo was sold at 25 cents per barrel for sound potatoes and realized about \$200. The schooner is not leaking and no repairs have been effected.

ASSAULT CASE DISMISSED.—An assault case was tried yesterday before J. T. McLaughlin and J. McEwen, J. P.'s. Roderick Nicholson charged Donald McLeod with having assaulted him a few days ago. Both parties belong to Bradalbane, and a number of their neighbors were present at the trial. The evidence being very contradictory, the magistrate dismissed the case.

THUMB INJURED.—A man named Alexander McDougall, belonging to Fairview, West River, had one of his thumbs badly injured a few days ago. The accident occurred while McDougall was working in the woods, and was caused by his accidentally getting his hand in between a falling tree and a stump. Dr. Warburton put several stitches in the injured thumb.

SKATING CHAMPIONS.—The Directors of the rink desire to inform the public that there is a strong probability of the champion skaters of the world visiting Charlottetown early next week. Arrangements are at present being made with Hagen, Norseng, McCormack and others, and due notice will be given in the advertising columns of the daily papers if such arrangements succeed. The expense will be very great, but the citizens will have an opportunity of seeing speed in skating such as they may never see again.

AN ENTERTAINMENT AT FALCONWOOD.—Through the kindness of the Citizens Band, under the genial leadership of Mr. Galbraith, the inmates at Falconwood Hospital for the insane had a thoroughly enjoyable time for a couple of hours last evening. It was pleasant to witness the keen appreciation of the music by the patients, and if, through the generosity of the benevolent public, such entertainments were more frequently repeated, they would greatly tend to the amelioration of the condition of the unfortunate beings bereft of reason.
