- 3 tbsps butter
- 1 onion, fine-chopped
- 2 sections garlic, crushed
- 1/2 green pepper, fine-chopped
- 1/2 lb chopped raw beef
- 1/2 lb "hot" Italian sausage (skin removed)
- 1 (No. 2) can tomato
- 1 tbsps sugar
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tsp salt
- 6 cloves
- 1/4 tsp ground basil
- 2 tbsps chili powder
- 1 (1 lb) can red kidney beans
- Melt butter in 2 1/2 qt. saucepan; add onion, garlic and pepper; saute until lightly browned. Add beef, cook until it breaks in small pellets and is gray in color. Fry sausage in separate pan, drain off fat, chop sausage and add to beef mixture. Stir in tomato, the sugar and seasonings. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer uncovered 1 hr or until mixture reaches desired thickness. Add 1 drained (1 lb.) can red kidney beans 10 min before chili will be done.

Players themselves have had their choice of outfits curbed by the All-England Lawn Tennis Club's no-nonsense attitude. The Wimbledon authorities insist on plain white costumes. Leading sportswear designer Teddy Tinling cancelled his fashion preview this year in disgust over reinforcement of the rules, and watered down his designs for the 55 women players wearing them at this season's Wimbledon.
