NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

THE popularity of this royally bred stallion Craichmore is shown by a letter handed to the Guardian by a prominent horse breeder who lives near Kensington to Craichmore's owner, urging him to send the horse forthrightly to Kensington, guaranteeing him 20 well bred mares at that place alone. Much disappointment is felt all through that section of Prince Co. that Mr. Douglas (former owner) allowed the horse to leave it as his stock is much superior to all others. Dr. Strickland informs the Guardian that it is his intention to give handsome prizes at the coming exhibition for Commadore Ledyard's colts and for Craichmore's next year.

A CORRESPONDENT OF Salisbury N. B. writing to the Guardian says: "It is generally regretted by horsemen in a large section of New Brunswick and especially in the counties of Westmorland, Kings and Albert that Lewis A. Wright (former owner) has sold the valuable young Clydesdale stallion Casper. This horse easily stands at the head of his class as clearly evinced from the fact that since he was imported some five or six years ago he has always taken first prize at all the big horse shows in Canada where exhibited and has proved to be a first winner in both upper and lower Canada. His colts are also showing the same fine qualities and have won prize winners wherever exhibited. The purchaser of this fine animal is David Reid, of Victoria Cross, P. E. Island, and in taking this horse to the Island Mr. Reid furnishes a rare opportunity for the horse breeders of that province to improve their already fine class of draught horses."

EQUITY, 2:14, is dead. They want John M., 2:07, out in Manitoba to trim the wings of Hazel Patch.

Katherine A., 2:14, has been brought by D. C. Palmer, the owner of Barrenmore, 2:14.

Eralma, the dam of Boralma and Pan Michael, has a colt at foal by Sydney Dillon.

One of the most promising green trotters in New England is the sister to Loonah, owned at Thorndale farm. George Bernard is at the Brockton track with the Washburn horses, including Redonda, 2:12; Second Edition, 2:24 and a promising filly by Achille, 2:14.

W. P. Murray, of Cleveland, offered \$1,000 for the eight-months-old filly by John A. McKerron, 2:04, out of Anzella, 2:06. The offer was called to Frank Canton, Moscow, Russia, owner of Anzella, but was not accepted.

THOMAS E. HOLMES, who drove General Fiske on the Moncton track last year stated also that he has four horses in training on the Sussex track. Speaking of the track he said that it was in 2nd condition and that for the past three weeks he has been at work training his horses. His horses are Little Tom, 2:30; Hal Reta, 2:15; Bushall and Lady Hurt, green horses. It will be remembered that at the late races in St. John last winter Bushall, after winning the first heat very easily, was protested and was not allowed to finish the race. Mr. Holmes then wrote to the secretary of the National Trotting Association and asked if there was anything against the horse Bushall. He received a reply which stated that there was absolutely nothing against either Bushall or Lady Hurt. Mr. Holmes went to a great deal of trouble to take his horses to St. John for the late races and naturally thinks that the St. John sports are a cheap lot. He further stated that he would race his horse everywhere except in St. John, and he hoped to be on the Moncton track at the various meets. He stated that the two green horses, Bushall and Lady Hurt are showing considerable speed and that he will put the horse which he purchased recently on the track as soon as it arrives.

FROM PRESENT INDICATIONS

the young Oakland Barons that Mr. Ruppert bred, and is now having trained, will contribute their full share of turf history before the close of the season, as they are all entered in the Futurities. None of them has shown any great speed to date but they are showing a great deal of promise. They are only fairly broken, but they show a way of going that freshens that several have a fair chance of duplicating the performance of their sire, who was one of the largest of Futurity winners. Two others, John Hight, of Louisville, and Frank Dobbie, of Binghamton, N. Y., were recently engaged for the purpose of devoting the principal part of their time to the youngsters. Hight has seven three-year-olds, three two-year-olds, all by Oakland Baron, and one two-year-old by Barrenmore, 2:14. In addition to one of the farm stallions, Truthful Chimes, 2:14, and the old Grand Circuit mare Cornelia Bala, 2:10, in his charge. One of the most likely of Hight's bunch is the two-year-old filly by Oakland Baron out of Zada (the dam of Bay Star, 2:38). This filly is only barely broken but can brush a 2:40 clip and is just such a gaited one as would be selected to improve steadily and make a fast youngster. Still another good gaited two-year-old that we saw Hight work was one out of Helen T. (a full sister to Arion 2:07). A three-year-old colt out of Iponna, 2:30, by Favorite Wilkes, 2:24, grandam Clara Medina, a great brood mare by Happy Medina, fairly jugged a quarter in 30 seconds. There is a little doubt but what this youngster will be able to reel off a quarter near a 2:30 gait within the next fortnight, as he is another one of the kind that one would mark to trot fast.

ORPHAN JACK, a beautiful dark bay stallion weighing 1000 lbs. and owned by John Watts, Hampshire, was greatly admired while shown in the market square yesterday.

AQUIRI 4051, the colt imported this week by J. M. Nicholson, Charlottetown is a bay trotter, foaled May 26, 1904, by Aquila a son of Bingen 2:04, and Lesura, by Allerton 2:03, next dam Cyrrus (dam of 6 in 11) by Strathmore 4:08, next dam Aspinola (dam of 1 and 1 producer) by Belmont 01, next dam Patsie Burns (dam of 2 producers) by Paddy Burns, next dam by Medoc thoroughbred. Aquiri's dam is Eutaxia (dame of Arta with a trial in 1905 in 2:10, a half in 1:07) by Expedition 2:15 (a son of Electioneer and Lady Russell (dam of 5 in 11) and sire of 40 in 11, and of the dams of 2 in the list.) 2nd dam: Eventide (dam of 30 in 11, 2:07, Evermond 2:14, Erin 2:24) and 3 producers of speed, by Woodford Mambrino 2:15, (Sire of 13 in the list, of 25 producing sons, and of the dams of 44 in the list.) 3rd dam: Vara (dam of Lord Vara P. 2:10, Vatican 2:29) and 5 producers) by Hambletonian 10, 4th Dam Venus (the dame of 3 producing daughters, Vara, Vassar and Vesper Bell, Venus has 236 descendants in 2:30 and 7 in 2:07 or better) by American Star 14 (sire of 4 in the list, of 7 producing sons, and of the dams of 49 in the list, including Robert McGregor 2:17, the sire of Crescendo 2:02.) 101 trotters with records from 1:59 1/2 to 2:10 are descended from American Star 14.

IN THE YEAR 1830 the shadow of a mighty horse in harness appeared on the trotting dial, a horse whose victories over all competitors and triumph over time fill one of the most illustrious pages in the achievements of the American trotter. This was the mare Flora Tenille, the first horse to trot a mile below 2:30, which she did at Kalamazoo, Mich., Oct., 1850, going the third heat in 2:10. She gained a world's record Sept. 2, 1850, 2:24, driven by Hiram Woodruff. In 1850, driven by James D. McMann, she reduced this successively to 2:23, 2:22, 2:21, and finally to 2:10, a record which stood for eight years, when Dexter, July 30, 1857, over the Riverstone course, Brighton, trotted in 2:10. In 1859, she won a two-mile race, in harness, in 4:05, which was the race record for a great many years, and possibly is now. She won a three-mile race to wagon the same year in 7:14, which is the record now for a race to four wheels. Flora Tenille was a "little runt," standing not more than 14 1/2 hands, well put together, legs as clean as a deer's and an eye bright, prominent and full of a devil-may-care spirit. She was foaled in 1845 and sired by a horse called One-Eyed Hunter, by Kentucky Hunter, dam by a spotted Arabian horse of whom little is known. She was foaled on the farm of Samuel Welch, near Upton, N. Y. At four years of age she was so unmanageable that she was considered worthless and was sold for \$13. She changed hands two or three times and one Sunday morning in June, 1850, was seen by Jonathan Velez, passing by his house in the little village of Washington Hollow, Dutchess County, N. Y., hitched to the hind end of a drover's wagon. She pleased his practiced eye, and, calling to the driver, who was riding a powerful gray stallion, inquired if the little mare was for sale. The reply brought forth a display of high horse dealing diplomacy which lasted half an hour, at the end of which the little mare passed into Mr. Velez's hands for \$17.

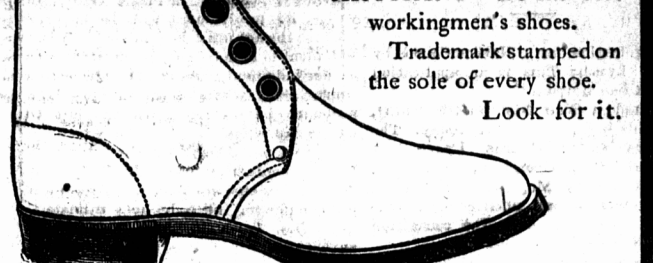
