## BEARS RESPONSIBILITY

The Soviet note — handed to West German Ambassador Wilhelm Haas by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko — declared West Germany was setting itself up as an arbiter in the London negotiations. The note also accused West Germany of trying to make agreement on disarmament "on certain conditions."

Recent statements by Soviet leaders have disclosed they see no prospect of German unification at this time. Nikita Khrushchev, the Soviet Communist party secretary, has said the Russians do not desire to talk with the other powers on unification. He said "there are two Germanys and any realistic person must recognize this fact."

## Czech Priests Go To Prison

OSTRAVA, Czechoslovakia (Reuters) — Eight Czechoslovak Roman Catholic priests were sentenced Thursday to jail terms up to 4½ years for "subversive activities against the state."

The priests are members of the Society of St. Francis deSales. They had been charged with trying to "disorganize" the Communist regime in Czechoslovakia. Among other alleged anti-state activities, the priests were said to have kept the Priestly order here in existence for the last five years despite its official dissolution after the Communists came to power in 1948.

## Potato Freight Rates Are Reduced On Agreed Charge

"Effective July 1st the freight rate on potatoes moving under Agreed Charge Contract No. 75, from Prince Edward Island points to destinations in Quebec and Ontario, will be lower by about 4 cents per cwt." reports Mr. E. W. Campbell, Manager of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board.

This is the sixth supplement that has been issued to the original contract which came into effect on March 1st, 1954, and a further supplement is in the process of being completed by the Board which will add the Canadian Pacific Railway Company as a signatory and other C.P.R. points as destinations with some resultant benefits. In the handling of these contracts the Potato Board acts in the interests of all Island Potato Shippers while the Canadian Freight Association represents the various Railway Companies concerned.
