

A Jewish Celebration.

The Jews throughout the world are now having an eight days' celebration of the victory of Hanukkah. This feast is simply the anniversary of the great victory of the Jews under Judas Maccabeus over the Greeks led by Antiochus. The Jewish nation, after returning to Jerusalem from its long captivity in Babylon, enjoyed a long term of peace. When Antiochus, with a large army of Greeks invaded Palestine, he found it easy to overcome the feeble opposition shown him by the Jewish armies, and finally succeeding in capturing Jerusalem. The Temple of Solomon, which had been restored by Zerubabel, was desecrated, and numerous other crimes were committed. At this crisis in the history of the Jewish race Judas Maccabeus and his seven sons led a movement against the invaders, which finally saved the country. They exhorted all the young men of the nation to keep up arms and after a violent struggle succeeded in driving the Greeks over the frontier. On the 25th day of the month Kislev, 2,009 years ago, the high priest re-entered the temple, and seven days later the edifice had been completely restored. Judas Maccabeus, with his own hands, relighted 'Nir Tomed' or perpetual lamp hanging in front of the ark, which the invaders had wantonly extinguished. He used, on this occasion, a small quantity of consecrated oil which he had saved from the hands of the foe. In commemoration of the restoration of the temple the children of Israel have ever after celebrated annually an eight days' feast.
