## Urges Interest In Language Study

MONTREAL, (CP)—Dr. Albert W. Trueman, president of the University of New Brunswick, Monday urged the public to take a more active interest in the study of language.

He told a Canadian Club luncheon that the public failed to understand the importance of language, valuable in teaching people to understand the affairs of a troubled world.

"It is true that we pay lip service to the claims of language study by retaining in our curricula for lower schools, English composition," he said. "But grammar has been sadly reduced in rank and Latin, which used to direct the students' attention to the anatomy of language, is fast disappearing."

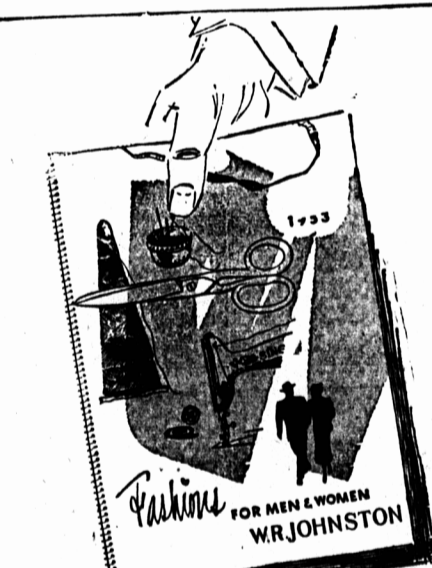
