## Interesting Contests Seen In Civic Election

**MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
The first town council meeting at Montague of the New Year, and possibly the final for some of its members, took place last evening in the council chambers.  
Present for the meeting were councillors Frank Greene, John Hughes, Cecil Beck, Preston MacLure and Cameron Reid. Councillor Dr. A.E. Ings, was unable to attend.  
Indications are that an election for mayor will be necessary. Mayor B.H. Yeo stated he would run for a fifth term, while a former councillor Gilbert R. Clements, who contested the seat on a previous occasion, will offer for Mayor.  
Four councillors will re-offer while Cecil Beck and Dr. Ings will not re-offer. One resident, Leonard Munroe, has indicated he will run for a seat on the council. However, this would not mean an election is necessary as he would fill the vacancy left by Dr. Ings.  
Several other names have been mentioned: Douglas MacLaren, H.M. Smith, Peter Sinclair, Ralph Beck, Justin MacNeil and others. Several members of the council expressed disappointment that more residents are not offering, one stating it was the civic duty of all to take their turn.  
The town clerk, G. Arnold Wightman, was given instructions to make the necessary arrangements for an election. Nomination day will be Tuesday, Jan. 19 with election day on Tuesday, Feb. 2.  
**NEW RINK**  
The council agreed to support the community welfare league in the building of a new hockey and skating rink. This rink is expected to cost in the vicinity of \$65,000. The league had approximately \$22,000 from the sale of the old rink and also owns the grounds for the new rink.  
This rink would be of natural ice with the artificial ice plant to be added when feasible. The town could borrow the necessary money through the municipal loan fund or the league could possibly borrow the money if backed by the town. It was learned the matter is to be further investigated.  
In the meantime the league, which would most likely operate the rink, has been assisted financially by the town to get a plan for the new rink with all the facts and figures to be presented to the council in the near future.

## Two Accused In Break Case May Face Further Charges

William Earl MacFarlane and Roger Paul Gallant, both of Charlottetown, who are charged in City Police Court with break entry and theft, were remanded to Thursday, Jan. 14. When they appeared yesterday, MacFarlane changed his previous election of trial before a judge without jury to trial before a magistrate, and City Magistrate James Haslem will hear the case. The procedure previously elected by Gallant and the accused stated, and a preliminary hearing will be held Thursday to determine if there is sufficient evidence to send him to a higher court. The two accused were arrested early Saturday morning following a break into the service station operated on 52 x 110 x Street by Buster MacMillan and first appeared in court Saturday. Police reported a quantity of goods, estimated at \$300 value, recovered and stated other charges might also be filed.

## Candidates Suggested

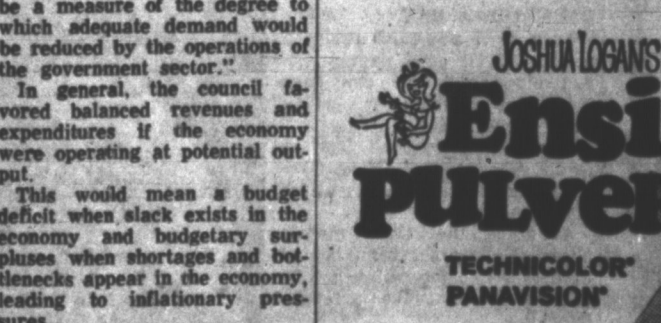

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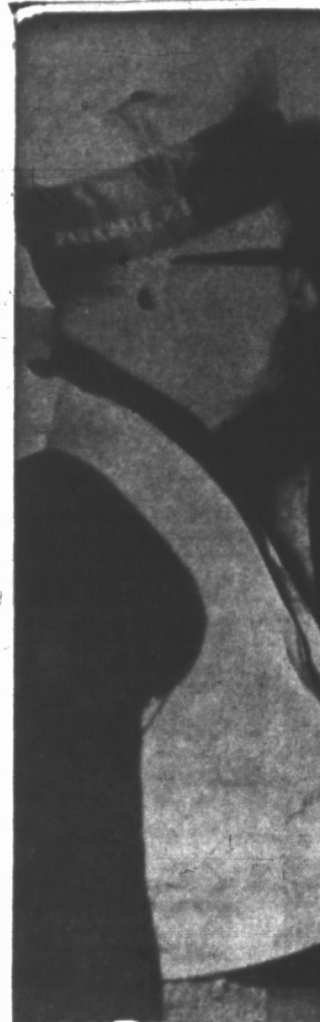
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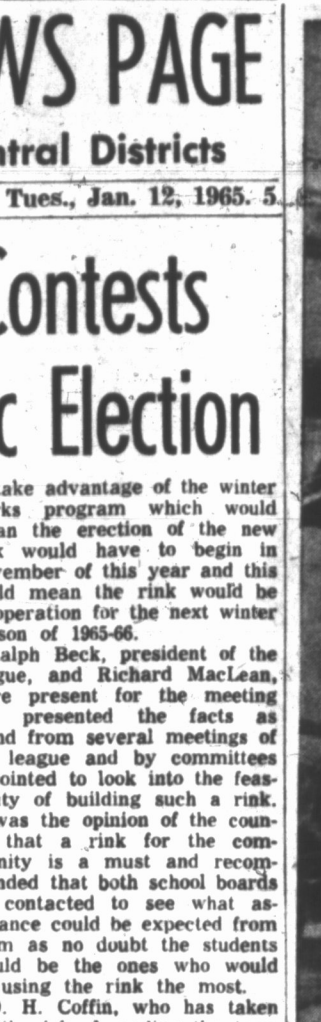
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
