SHARK CAPTURED IN BEDFORD BASIN.—The big shark that has been sporting about Bedford Basin the past few days was captured yesterday afternoon. It got in shallow water in the cove near the Florence hotel, and several men from Moir's mill concocted a scheme to capture it. They got several large ropes and lassoed it, and by this means they hauled his sharkship in on the beach. It made a desperate fight for freedom, but they safely landed it. It was a monster too, being over ten feet in length and weighing several hundred pounds.—Halifax Chronicle.

A DECIDED ATTRACTION.—Our citizens can look forward with pleasant anticipation to an event of more than ordinary interest which they will have the opportunity of witnessing next week—we refer to an exhibition of the Royal Dragoons who will have charge of the school of equitation to be opened here on Wednesday next. The exhibition will take place on Wednesday and Thursday next at the Charlottetown Driving Park, in connection with the horse races to take place on those days. The exercise will consist of cavalry sword drill, Victoria cross drill when examples of rescue of wounded men will be given by the mounted dragoons, and a wrestling bout on horseback. This attraction in connection with the races is one that the managers deserve great credit for, and the kindness of the commanding officer in allowing the men to appear will no doubt be heartily appreciated.

THE BOAT RACE.—The boat race will begin to-morrow at one o'clock. The whole course is within full view of the city. The extreme eastern buoy is off the Railway wharf and the southern and western buoys are off Brickmakers point and Rocky Point. The committee desire that all those who go to see the race may be enabled to view it from start to finish. Batt's Bros. steamboat will be in charge of the judge of the course, and an admission fee of 10 cents only has been decided upon, so that all who wish a pleasant excursion while following the racing boats, may avail themselves of this trip for a nominal consideration. The steamer will call at the wharf at intervals. The idea is not to make money but to induce our citizens to interest themselves in this line of sport. If a fine day, tomorrow's arrangements offer a rare chance to pleasure seekers. The races will start from a line which will be stretched from the wharf to a vessel at anchor. The sails will not be set until after the starting signal is given. No time allowance will be made, the leading boat wins the race.
