FRANCE TO STAND BY ALLIES

PARIS, May 29.—France does not wish to abandon her Allies, but she will not permit the vanquished to become more powerful than the victors. M. Clemenceau, France's war premier, declared in an impromptu speech delivered last night at a banquet after the unveiling of the monument at Nantes to teachers and students who fell in the war.

"We will not abandon our allies. On the contrary, we desire to remain united with them," M. Clemenceau said. "However, we demand a little justice in our behalf, and we shall not forget the assistance which was given. Nor shall we forget our duty, and we ask that on their side they understand they do not accuse us of ulterior motives."
