I. O. O. F.

ELECTION OF GRAND OFFICERS.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

PICTOU, Aug. 15.

The election of grand officers I. O. O. F. resulted as follows:—Gilbert Murdock, St. John, Grand Master; Harris Van Blarcom, Annapolis, D. G. M.; Thomas Turnbull, Vale Colliery, G. W.; J. C. H. Fraser, Halifax, G. Sec'y; H. A. Taylor, Halifax, G. Treasurer; Frank Graham, Halifax, G. Representative; Benj. Bremner, D. D. G. M. for Charlottetown. The next communication will be held at St. John, N. B. The Island representatives return to-morrow.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.

The men arrested during yesterday's disturbance were remanded by the police magistrate for trial to-day. The parties wounded are progressing favorably. Several rows took place in this city between the Orange and Green to-day.

Lord Dufferin has received from England Her Majesty's gift of £10,000 sterling to the city of Quebec for the construction of Kent gate. Before starting for the Eastern townships His Excellency inspected the repairs to the city walls now being effected under the direction of the Dominion Government.

The vice-regal party left to-day by special train for the Eastern townships, the depot at Levis being handsomely decorated for the occasion. Their Excellencies will probably return to Quebec in about fifteen days. At Danville they met with an enthusiastic reception.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.

A fire occurred this evening in a tin and ironmongery store of Prowse Bros., St. James street. Loss from \$15,000 to \$20,000. The stock was insured in the Royal, North British, Royal Canadian and Aetna for \$22,000. The buildings were insured in the Royal for \$12,000.

BARRIE, ONT., Aug. 13.

In the double scull race for irrigated boats one mile and return, four boats started. The race was won by Plaisted and mate; Gardner Bros. were second. Time, 16.46.

The consolation race, single scull, was won by Plaisted; Luther was second. The time was 29.59.

VIENNA, Aug. 13.

General Philippovich has telegraphed that he would effect a junction with the Army of Grand Duke of Thuremburg, near Vites, to day.

The 20th Austrian division has not been able to reach Sewould. Its out-posts fought a battle with the insurgents near Grasehanitz, on the 4th inst. The division was also engaged on the 8th 9th and 10th inst. It advanced close to Tusha, but in consequence of the scarcity of supplies and exhaustion of the draught animals they were obliged to fall back on Grasehanitz to secure its communications and not to be compelled to do so by the enemy. The losses of the 20th Division are not reported.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 13.

According to advices from Zerajez insurgent Government has sent Hepz Pasha to meet Austrians to ask their leniency to insurgents. It is thought at Constantinople impossible that the Bosnians can prolong their resistance. With the view, therefore, to tranquilize them, the Porte has appointed Mehemet Ali Pasha its commissioner in Bosnia. He will start thither immediately.

The Porte, to obviate further depreciation of Turkish currency, has decided to import duties on salt, tobacco and spirits, to the extent permitted by its treaties of commerce.

PORTSMOUTH, England, Aug. 13, 6 p.m.

The weather was unfavorable for the naval review, as the wind was blowing half a gale. Nevertheless a large number of spectators were present. The Queen in the Royal yacht passed through the fleet of broadside ships, turret ships, sloops of war, gunboats and torpedo boats, numbering in all 2 men-of-war drawn up in line, but no evolutions were attempted. The rain poured in torrents, and the review as a spectacle was a failure.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

A despatch from Laranen, Cyprus, says that the troops are suffering considerably from fever, which is usually prevalent there. At this time of the year its effects are weakening, but not fatal.

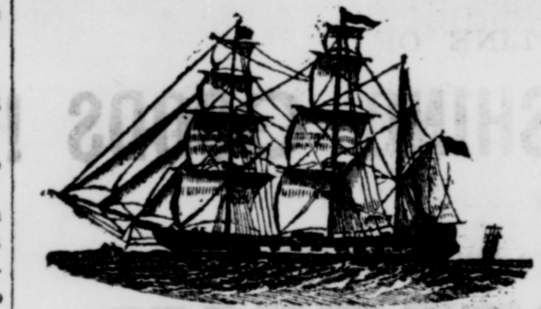
