American League Attendance Up

CHICAGO (AP) — American League attendance this season jumped almost four per cent over last year and, for the seventh time in the last decade, passed the 8,000,000 mark.

Total home attendance for the eight baseball clubs was 8,196,218 compared with 7,893,683 last year, the league disclosed Thursday.

Although the champion New York Yankees led all clubs with attendance of 1,497,154, the runner-up Chicago White Sox turned in the biggest increase over the previous year, up 5,578 with a fourth-place total of 1,135,668. Yankees increased 5,336 over a year.

Second in total attendance were Detroit Tigers with 672,846, followed by Boston Red Sox with 1,181,087. The Tigers picked up 22,164 over last year. Sox increased 47,929.

The cause for speculation is a spirited filly, Pink Velvet by name and owned by Toronto's Bill Beasley. Pink Velvet dashed the mud and slush Wednesday to gallop 1/4 miles in 1:31.1, the fastest training movie ever time-furlong ever recorded in Canada.

The spirit made the railbirds form a chant. It wasn't too surprising to cheerleaders because Pink Velvet has won eight races and more than \$80,000 this season and is considered by some critics the best mare to perform on a Canadian course in the last 30 years.

Saturdays age-for-weight race over one mile and five furlongs has attracted a field of about 10 horses, including four from Canada. The starting field will be known Friday when owners pay \$500, the final acceptance fee.
