THERE was rather an interesting debate at the Educational Institute last evening. Henry Lawson, Esq., read a very nice paper on "novel reading," and Dr. Leeming, Dr. Murray, D. Montgomery, Esq., Rev. Mr. McNeill, A. McNeill, Esq., and D. McKenzie, Esq., talked the matter over. Mr. Thos. LePage, read a selection from George Eliot and Miss Ellen Lawson one from Dickens.

MAILS.—On Friday ninety bags of mail matter were brought over from Cape Tormentine by six boats, while at the same time our mails for the previous four days, consisting of sixty bags, were taken to the other side by four boats. As it takes four men on an average to an ice boat, forty men and ten boats must have been employed in conveying the mails across the Straits on a single day. Including mail drivers to Charlottetown and Summerside, there were probably fifty persons in all employed in the conveyance of those mails on that day.

THE number of persons charged before magistrates in England and Wales in the last year, with being drunk and disorderly, is more than double the number charged in 1863, nearly twenty years ago. The increase was chiefly from 1867 to 1873, the first year of the Intoxicating Liquors Act, since which time the number has been nearly stationary. In 1867 the number was 100,357; in 1868, 111,465; in 1869, 122,310; in 1870, 131,879; in 1871, 142,343; in 1872, 151,084; and in 1873 it leaped to 192,941, whereas until it has stood. The increase of drunkenness is reported as among men; the crime has diminished among women.

THE "Saturday Review" remarks that Guitea is a typical American, urging that not merely the peculiar offensiveness of the criminal but the peculiarity of the crime itself is directly traceable to democracy. The scandals of the trial, it says, are directly connected with democratic politics and society, and it suggests that Guitea's outbreaks in the court proceeded from generous indignation at finding his liberty restrained, his motives questioned, and his character assailed. It points to the shooting of the President as a result of one hundred years of unbridled democracy, and concludes that the Democratic helot may at least be thanked for an instructive lesson.

THE Ameer of Afghanistan is developing blood-thirsty tendencies to an alarming degree. Eleven hundred persons are imprisoned in Cabul for political purposes.

WHEN the Marquis of Lorne left Liverpool for Canada the working opticians of that city presented him with a pair of eye-preservers, to protect him against the "glare of the snow in Canada."

PRINCE BISMARCK, who is the object of much private generosity on the part of his own countrymen, has just received a present of a tame wolf from some Russian prince—a zoological specimen which will form, it is to be hoped, an agreeable companion to the Chancellor's famous dog.
