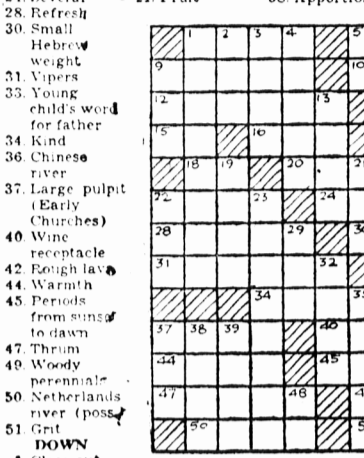

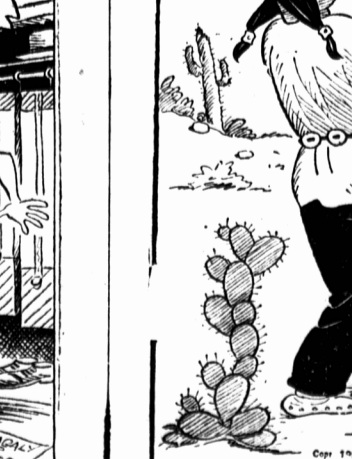

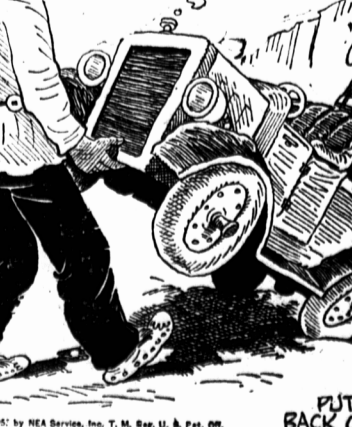

Island Odds And Ends

Travel Bureau authorities are of the opinion that Charlottetown Old Home Week will draw the biggest crowd in its history this year. This is a very pleasant forecast, and it is to be hoped nothing unforeseen occurs to change it between now and August.

Down at Georgetown the Redmond Export Company of Halifax is preparing to operate a new fish plant. Before the company can go forward with its plans an electric power line must be run into the town, capable of supplying juice for modern machinery. The present line can carry only enough load to give light to homes and stores. The new line is already assured by the Maritime Electric. It is understood that the Company will do some building this summer and autumn. Already some fish are being handled every day.

The National Employment office has received a number of orders for haymakers whom they expect to be able to secure in Cape Breton. Most farmers are asking that the help be available this week or early next week.

Babe Britton's mile in 2:08 4-5 has the horsemen talking. Len O'Meara is receiving great credit for his handling of the pacer, far from an easy animal to pilot in a field of any size. O'Meara had a great night on Saturday with five wins and a brace of seconds.

Sturgeon and China Point have been paying dividends to the trout fishermen. Allison Huestis, formerly of Charlottetown, but now residing in Halifax, has had great luck at Sturgeon. Winding up a two weeks' vacation "Boodie" as he was called in his younger days, caught more than sixty trout in a week's fishing at Sturgeon, many of them over a pound and some of them around two pounds. China Point it is said, has been equally rewarding.

Mount Stewart is probably the strawberry capital of the province. In addition to the people living in the general area of the village, a large number of pickers and hullers have been recruited in Charlottetown to work for the Mt. Stewart Strawberry Exchange. Trucks come to Charlottetown every morning to pick up the workers at 7:30 a. m., in front of the National Employment office. Berry pickers are paid four cents a box.

A survey of wages paid to motor mechanics in Charlottetown has just been carried out on behalf of the Department of Labor. Six garages were interviewed. It is understood that the average wage is 90c to \$1.00 an hour. The better qualified men were paid at this rate, others are drawing \$30.00 to \$35.00 a week.

H. J. Kennedy, manager of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Exhibition Association is knee deep in smoothing out arrangements for the Island's great Annual Fair.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel company executives voice increasing optimism over four-quarter sales prospects for large tonnage items, the metalworking weekly, Steel, said Sunday.

Producers foresee a strong demand continuing for sheets, plates, structural shapes, bars and seamless tubing, the magazine said. Those products, it pointed out, comprise more than half of the tonnage of finished steel shipped by mills.

Key barometer to steel demand outlook is the automobile industry, steel's chief consumer. Steel said: "Automakers are still displaying optimism, and they have set 626,100 cars as their production goal for July. This is almost 50,000 units above the number built in June."

On the other hand, the magazine noted a decided shift in the auto industry from a sellers' market to a buyers' market, and termed "alarming to some observers" the sluggishness of used car sales.

Meanwhile, ingot and casting production for the week ending July 11 registered 94.5 per cent of rated capacity, a decline of 1.5 points from the preceding week, but summer vacations, Steel said, were in full swing in steel plants.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market this week managed to squeeze out its fourth straight weekly advance.

There was, however, some evidence that the forward movement might be losing momentum.

On average the market has regained better than half of the sharp fall that started late in May when it appeared that a truce agreement was imminent in Korea.

The historic pattern for market behavior calls for a rise in July and August. Certainly the market has been going up so far in July. Volume, however, has been low, so low in fact that many believe the rally lacks enough backing to carry through.

Because of low volume, a tip downward as the week ended, didn't worry bulls very much. They felt that the rest of near-term market direction is yet to come.

Canadian issues closed out the week on a downward trend. Off fractions in Friday trading were McIntyre, Canadian Pacific, International Nickel and Dome Mines.

Hiram Walker and Distillers Seagram were both up.

Canadian issues on American stock exchange also were generally lower as the trading week ended.
