Mr. Laurier at Hamilton.

Mr. Laurier is going to address the young leaders of Hamilton shortly. An advance report of his speech has been secured at great expense and with much trouble. He will say: "Gentlemen, I greet with rapture the young hopefuls of Hamilton Liberalism now assembled before me. I am an English Liberal of the old school, and my present alliance with Count Mercier is maintained for the express purpose of letting the country see what a great contrast there is between my principles and his. (Cheers.) In no more effective way could the excellence of our party over the corruption of Toryism be illustrated. (More cheers.) Gentlemen, we have a great country. (A voice—"Question.") Yes, despite my friend's objection, which I admit has weight, we have a great country, and it is our bounden duty to preserve it intact—(some murmurs)—for the continent to which it belongs. It is all very well to talk loyalty—(Voice—"Bosh")—but loyalty to one's pocket is a practical age like this (Cheers, hearty) We carried out that policy in Quebec, gentlemen, with entire success for five happy years, until Mr. Mercier forgot that anyone had a pocket but himself, and then trouble came. But we have sowed up his pocket—(laughter)—and we hope for better times. It is suggested that we call a party convention, and, my friends, when I look around this sea of faces I think what a picnic it would be. Yes, gentlemen, this is no season for picnics and it is our duty to forego ourselves the pleasure. You will continue as before, I feel sure, to hold up the cause of your leaders in Parliament, and we will continue just as earnestly to try and get a chance of holding up the country. My amiable friend, Sir Richard Cartwright, is keeping quiet just now—(Voice—"Good idea")—but he will shortly emerge with a fresh stock of adjectives to hurl at our hereditary enemies, and you will be surprised at the result."

The City Court.

Sir, The Judge of the County Court of Queen's County has apparently taken the opportunity of raising a doubt as to the jurisdiction of the Spendiary Magistrate as Judge of the City Court, in a suit in which a merchant citizen sought to enforce his right to collect a debt admittedly due against a debtor, who, to say the least of him, has earned an unenviable notoriety in the ability he has displayed to evade payment of his debts.

Most laymen will not readily understand why the County Court Judge should undertake to give judgment on a point not raised in his court. The point actually at issue before him was, whether under the consolidated city charter, the execution in the case referred to, should have been issued by the Clerk of the Court or by the Magistrate himself as such Judge.

It is a point which the wording of the statute renders doubtful, and the practice of the City Court has, invariably, been to leave the judgment creditor to his remedy by ordinary execution, rather than issue for him a doubtful writ, which might subject him to an action for false imprisonment. Whether the Provincial or Dominion Governments have the power of appointing the City Court Judge, might well have been left to an authoritative tribunal; and in justice to the counsel for the defendant, it may be stated that he did not ask or argue for any decision on that point before the County Court Judge. The power of the Provincial Government to make such appointments is a grave constitutional question, one that can only be settled before the Supreme Court, or the highest court of appeal, on argument carefully presented by counsel, fully instructed. No County Court judgment can possibly effect the question.

I write now, however, to raise another question of much interest to citizens, namely, whether it is at all necessary for the collection of small debts in the city to have two courts of almost co-ordinate jurisdiction. The City Court, of the city, with its monthly sittings, provides ample accommodation of all parties. The law provides that in all criminal matters the Spendiary Magistrate shall have sole jurisdiction in the city. This has been found to work well, and with full power of appeal direct to the Supreme Court, suitors are not subject to the anomaly of clashing judgments. It is not a particularly edifying spectacle to see a court in one court obtain judgment on the confession of the defendant, and by another court of equally inferior jurisdiction be deprived of the benefit of such judgment unless he adopts the expensive course of an appeal to the Supreme Court.
