

Local and Other Items.

NEIGHBOUR.—The dust nuisance has begun and people are asking what has become of the watering cart.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT.—James Joy, drunk, \$3 or 8 days. One Scott Act case dismissed and four adjourned.

SHOULD BE REMOVED.—The pile of ashes at the northern entrance to Queen Square should be removed at once and the large gates opened up.

QUEEN SQUARE.—A meeting of all interested in the Queen Square Gardens will be held in the Legislative Library on Saturday, the 12th inst., at four o'clock.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.—The examination of candidates for second and first class teachers' certificates will begin on the 24th inst. Candidates' names must be enrolled before the 21st inst.

THE STONE CRUSHER.—We are glad to see that the stone crusher is at work once more. A large lot of stone is now on the wharf which when broken and put on our streets, will, no doubt, be a great improvement.

KERMIS.—The ladies of St. Peter's Church will hold a Kermis on board the steamer Southport on the 14th inst. St. Peter's Boys' Band will be in attendance, and there will be refreshments and other attractions.

TOOK THE HINT.—The City Surveyor, acting upon the advice given in yesterday's issue, has had the dangerous hole near King Street crossing filled up. He is also attending to some of the ruts in the other street. This is right.

ADMINISTRATOR.—A Michigan correspondent of Wallace's Monthly asks: "Is Administrator dead?" No, the fine old horse is lively and kicking, and may be seen at Large's stables in this city on the first three days of every week.

ROBBING THE CHURCH.—Quite a sensation was caused in the village of St. Constant, La Prairie County, Que., on Sunday last, when it was discovered, upon going to church, that the sacred edifice had been broken into during the night; the poor box broken open, and a considerable sum of money extracted.

BOSCO FOOLER.—The Summerside Journal says: Some one passed a \$2 Bank of P. E. I. note on Bosco at the Market Hall last week, thus receiving not only free admission, but \$1.65 good money for bad. This was one of the most successful tricks played during "Mr." Bosco's visit, and surpassed anything attempted by that individual.

HIGH LICENSE.—The high license bill, as passed, to be engrossed by the Massachusetts Senate, fixes the rate of licenses at \$1000 for 1st class; \$250 for 2d and 3d classes each; \$200 for 4th class; \$150 for 5th class; and \$100 for 6th class. The Senate amended the bill so that it shall go into effect on the 1st of July, but inasmuch as licenses are issued on the 1st of May, the law will have no effect this year except upon licenses granted this year.

DISGRACEFUL.—Two very disgraceful rows took place in the city last evening. One was on Queen Street and the other on the Cross Street off Easton, west of Pownall Street. At the former it is said knives were drawn, and were it not for the interference of certain citizens, some one would have been injured; at the latter pitchforks and stones were the weapons used. One of the participants in the first-mentioned affair has been arrested.

THE STEAMERS.—The Princess of Wales arrived from Pictou about seven o'clock last evening. Captain Cameron reports the ice solid between Caribou and Wood Islands, and as far westward as could be seen from the steamer. She left again for Pictou this morning and will return this evening. The St. Lawrence arrived at Summerside from Point du Chene about nine o'clock this forenoon, and will return this afternoon. She encountered a good deal of ice. The Carroll arrived from Boston with a general cargo and several passengers this forenoon. Captain Brown, as will be seen by his report elsewhere, met a good deal of ice.

CHURCH SERVICES.—Rev. J. Hutchison, M. A. has been appointed to officiate at Cavendish on Sabbath first, the 13th inst., at the usual hours.

To-day being the Feast of the Ascension, the usual services were held in St. Dunstan's Cathedral; also in St. Paul's and St. Peter's Churches.

Rev. E. Gillies will preach in Georgetown on Sabbath 13th inst., at 11 a. m., and Rev. D. McLeod, M. A., at 7 p. m., same day.

The Rev. John Goodwill will (D. V.) preach in the Broadfield Church in English and Gaelic on Sunday, May 13th, at half-past two, p. m.

There will be (D. V.) service same day at 10.30 a. m. in the New Glasgow Road Church.

BLEW OUT THE GAS.—An Antigonish man named Peter Curless arrived in Halifax on Monday and put up at the Queen Hotel. He retired to rest about nine o'clock. About two hours later one of the bell boys noticed a smell of gas in the vicinity of Curless' room. He reported the matter to the clerk, who in company with the night porter went to investigate. After satisfying themselves that the odor of gas came from Curless' room, they knocked but received no answer. The door was then forced in and they found the occupant stretched out insensible. They at once raised an alarm and Dr. Cameron appearing on the scene succeeded in bringing the man to. The doctor remarked that had Curless been in the room half an hour longer death would have been the result. It transpired afterwards that Curless had blown out the gas, and then fallen asleep.

BAD SIDEWALK.—Mrs. Cameron, an elderly lady who has the care of the school houses on Bridge and Weldon streets, met with a serious accident on Saturday morning on Robinson street. She was going from her home on the Mountain road to the school houses in company with a girl, when the latter stepped on the end of a loose plank, over which Mrs. Cameron tripped and fell, breaking two of her ribs, putting her shoulder out of joint and knocking some of her teeth out. It was said the plank was loosened in the sidewalk by a resident of the upper end of Robinson street while draining his property. Mrs. Cameron will bring an action for damages against the town.—Moncton Times.

There are a great many loose planks in the sidewalks in Charlottetown, and we may any day expect just such an accident as that reported in the Times.

ANNUAL MEETING.

Large Earnings and a Tidy Profit

New Arrangements and Fair Prospects

MONTREAL, May 9.

The seventh annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was held here to-day, when directors for the ensuing year were elected, Mr. George Stephen and Mr. VanHorne being elected President and Vice-President respectively. The report showed gross earnings for the year of \$12,606,412, and working expenses of \$8,102,296, with net earnings of \$3,505,118; less fixed charges, \$3,228,263, leaving a surplus of \$276,855. The report goes on to speak of the increased traffic, success of the steamship service between Vancouver, China and Japan, and other matters. Referring to the agreement recently executed between the Dominion Government and the company for the termination of the restrictions upon railways extending to the international boundary, the report says this agreement will put an end to the unfortunate agitation which has done so much harm to the Company and the country for the past two years, and will at the same time place the Company in a position to provide at a very low rate of interest the necessary capital required for permanent improvements of the Railway, additional rolling stock and facilities of all kinds, and rapidly increasing traffic, so that the surplus earnings may not in future be absorbed for these purposes, but may be devoted to the payment of dividends to shareholders.

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, May 9.

The annual statement of the Bank of Montreal has been completed, and will be submitted to the directors on Friday. It shows earnings of 10 1/2 per cent—\$75,000 it is said are carried forward to the rest.

A private despatch from Minneapolis says on the authority of Gov. Pillsbury that 1,000 shares more than a controlling interest in the Sault Ste. Marie road have been sold to the officials of the C. P. R.

Hon. Mr. Lavelle, Legislative Councillor, has been arrested on a charge of forgery, it is alleged committed 22nd Aug. 1885. He has been released, and a preliminary examination is to be held 16th inst.

Some members of the stock exchange are getting alarmed over the bucket shop bill since an intimation was made that five leading counsel are of opinion that it will reach many of the transactions on their board. The feeling was intensified this a. m., when it became known that their own counsel, A. H. Lunn, Q. C., holds the same view, and that the bill is too far-reaching in its provisions.

The promoters of the Virgin Mary statue have not given up the idea; but intend to put it in some private property on the Mount.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, May 9.

While at play at Sydney mines yesterday a dispute arose between two youths named Corcoran and Macdonald. Corcoran was struck by Macdonald across the breast with a baseball bat and instantly killed. The coroner's jury verdict was that the blow was delivered in self defence.

Donald Steele was drowned while crossing Bras d'Or Lake to-day. The ice is disappearing from Cape Breton coasts, and there is every prospect of a brisk summer trade.

Label Suit—A Defiance.

FREDERICTON, May 9.

Edward McGaughey, while working yesterday afternoon for the Boom Company, about two miles above the city, met with a serious accident. In using an axe it came off the handle and penetrated his body, between the shoulders, remaining there until he himself pulled it out. The doctor says the man had a narrow escape for his life.
