

Mantle Homers As Yanks Win; Braves Beat Cards

Mickey Mantle lined a home run into the right field bleachers with the score tied in the eighth inning Wednesday for a 3-2 New York Yankee victory over Baltimore Orioles. Bob Grim was the winning pitcher in relief of starter Art Ditmar.

Mantle's smash, his second homer of the year, came on the first pitch by Connie Johnson in the eighth.

In the only other afternoon major league game Del Crandall hit a home run in the last of the ninth for an 8-7 Milwaukee National League decision over St. Louis.

All the Braves runs in the free-swinging contest at Milwaukee in which they twice came from behind to tie the score, were brought across by homers before Crandall's blast. Ed Mathews drove home three runs with his first

homer of the season, Henry Aaron hit his third—also with two on—and Joe Adcock his second, with the bases empty.

For Aaron, it was the seventh-straight game in which he hit safely in a streak that started opening day. In the process the Braves have won six against one loss.

At New York, Yogi Berra's second homer of the season following a single by Mantle in the first inning had given Ditmar an early 2-0 lead.

Mantle and Bill Skowron led the Yanks with three hits each while Bob Boyd and George Kell each had three for Baltimore.

Successive two-out singles by Billy Gardner, and Dick Williams gave Baltimore a run in the third. Kell's third single, an infield out and Willy Miranda's single tied the score in the sixth.

The Orioles made four double plays.

Cincinnati Redlegs In 9-5 Victory Over Chicago Cubs

CINCINNATI (AP)—Cincinnati Redlegs walked to a 9-5 victory over Chicago Cubs here Wednesday night as Bruin pitchers set a new National League record for walks in one inning by giving bases on balls to nine Redlegs in the fifth. The Reds scored seven runs in that frame with only one hit.

It was Cincinnati's third consecutive victory after four straight season-opening losses.

Moe Drabowsky, Cub starting pitcher, was breezing along with a 2-1 lead when he suddenly lost all trace of the plate in the fifth. He walked five straight batters after one was out. Jackie Collum came in but he walked Bob Thurman to force home another run. Gus Bell's infield out scored

another run. Wally Post was given an intentional pass but George Grove singled home two runs and then the bases on balls business started all over again.

Collum gave up one more walk and Jim Brosnan yielded two more.

The old National League record of eight bases on balls in one inning was set back on May 4, 1910 when St. Louis Cardinals homered.

Prior to that Cub pitching debacle the game had been a tight battle of home runs. Jim Bolger and Cal Neeman got consecutive homers for the Cubs in the second off Joe Nuxhall and Bob Thurman got one for Cincinnati in the fourth.

Cleveland Barons Split \$22,196

NEW YORK (CP)—Cleveland Barons will split \$22,196 as their reward for winning the Calder Cup, the American Hockey League said Wednesday.

The total playoff pool of \$56,412 was one of the largest in years.

The Barons share was based on 12 per cent for winning their winning their semi-final series against Hershey Bears, 18 per cent for ousting Rochester Americans in the finals, and eight per cent for finishing the season in second place.

Rochester players will split \$17,823; Providence Reds, first place finishers who were eliminated in the semi-finals by Rochester, \$11,068; and Hershey \$7,503.

Senators Protest On Game Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP)—Washington Senators Wednesday formally protested a ruling that they must continue a game with the Baltimore Orioles halted Sunday night when the lights went out.

The action was a reversal of position for Calvin Griffith, president of the Washington Baseball Club. He had said Tuesday he would not appeal the decision by Will Harridge, president of the American League, that the game should be resumed.

Washington was leading Baltimore, 2-1, after five innings in the second game of a doubleheader Sunday when the game was stopped by a power failure.

Harridge said Tuesday, the game should be resumed starting with the sixth inning, when the Orioles are here on May 27.

In Chicago Harridge stood pat Wednesday on his ruling.

Abelardo De Lara Found In Trailer

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP)—Abelardo De Lara 51-year-old jockey from St. Albans, N.Y., was found dead in his trailer Tuesday. Indications were that he had suffered an electric shock from a vibrator.

Ben W. Grigsby of the Broward County sheriff's office said De Lara was in bed with the vibrator in his hand.

The jockey had ridden at Tropical Park in November and December and had been exercising horses at Gulfstream Park near here.

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Plans Were Discussed By The Provincial Rifle Assn.

The initial plans for operating a school for beginners was discussed Tuesday night at an enthusiastic meeting of the council of the Provincial Rifle Association, held at the offices of the Jenkins Transfer Co.

The school will begin as soon as sufficient numbers of new rifle men have indicated their interest and the instructors will come from among the senior marksmen throughout the province. All classes will be conducted at the Squaw Point Ranges, and rifles will be issued starting on May 6 and May 9.

Instead of the usual best two out of three qualifying shoots, one shoot will be held on Saturday, June 1st. The usual method of selecting the Ottawa team will remain with the top twenty-four members in the Ottawa aggregate, twelve of whom must be tyros.

Expect Golf Event In Japan

NEW YORK (AP)—Golfers from the same 20 nations that completed in the 1956 International Trophy and Canada Cup matches in England are expected to play in the 1957 events in Japan, John Jay Hopkins, chairman of the International Golf Association said Wednesday.

The 1957 matches will be played at the Kasumigaseki Country Club 30 miles from Tokyo, Oct. 24-27. The Canada Cup is a 72-hole stroke play for two-man teams which is decided on the combined scores. It is played concurrently with the individual competition for the International Trophy. The competitions were started in 1953.

The countries which competed in 1956 and have indicated they again will be represented are: Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Denmark, Egypt, England, France, Germany, Holland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Philippines, Portugal, Scotland, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United States and Wales.

Frank Clair Suggests Way To Overcome Bad Shortage

OTTAWA (CP)—Coach Frank Clair of Ottawa Rough Riders Wednesday suggested a way of overcoming the shortage of good football referees: Import them.

"I'm not taking anything away from the officials we now have," Clair said in an interview. "It's just that there are too few of them and the players and fans are seeing the same faces of officiating almost every week."

Last year, in the Big Four Football League there were about 15 officials. It takes five per game. Clair suggested one way to get around the difficulty would be to bring in Americans—say, from northern New York, close to Big Four cities—to work in exhibitions.

Four Canadians and two Americans, the latter mainly as observers, would work the exhibition games.

"It might take the Americans a year to become familiar with the Canadian rules, but football
