THE "St. Lawrence" will leave for Point de Chene to-morrow morning. The harbors of Summerside and Shediac are reported clear of ice, and it is expected that the steamer will make the trip without difficulty.

ANOTHER INDUSTRY.—We understand that a factory for the manufacture of pottery will shortly be established in connection with the Steam Brick Factory in the Royalty. Flower pots, milk pans, butter crocks, and all such wares, will be manufactured and sold much cheaper than those imported.

TO-MORROW, at 12 o'clock, noon, the Grand Division of P. E. Island will assemble in this city. The business first in order will be the initiation of representatives. Reports of officers, &c., will follow. In the evening a public temperance meeting will be held in the Market Hall, to commence at 8 o'clock. Among the speakers for the evening we notice the names of Revs. A. McGilvray, Dr. Murray, G. W. Hodgson, H. Foshay, and G. M. Campbell. A collection will be taken up to defray expenses. St. Patrick's Total Abstinence Society Brass Band will be in attendance.

REGULATIONS concerning the grinding of wheat, maize and other grain in bond are published by the Dominion Government. Also, regulations and orders respecting importation of cattle and other animals are published. They prohibit the importation of cattle and swine into Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island from the United States and from Europe, except at the ports of Halifax, St. John, and Quebec, in which ports the animals are subjected to inspection, and ninety days quarantine. American cattle and swine may, however, be conveyed through Canada in bond, at the ports of Sarnia, Windsor, and Amherst, being under strict isolation.

CONDUCTOR THOMPSON has been transferred to the Souris Branch and Mr. I. B. Grady, Train-despatcher, has been appointed Conductor of the Summerside train, instead of Mr. Thompson. The Patriot and Argus publish articles, construing the change into a "gigantic injustice" to Conductor Thompson, and a "detraction from the efficiency of the train service," etc. What knowledge of railway matters is possessed by our contemporaries we know not, but we cannot think it is so abundant that dictation to the Superintendent by the Editor of the Patriot or the Argus would not be considered impudent. The charge of inefficiency preferred, by the Argus, against Mr. Grady, is groundless, and the statement of the Patriot that he is to receive the highest pay of any Conductor is untrue. He has a large experience as relieving agent and train despatcher—thus being, at times, Chief Conductor,—and although he now conducts one of the most important trains on the road, he only receives the pay of a second-class conductor.

THE Lindley Opera and Comedy Company opened with a fair house last evening. The performance was first-class, and as good, if not better, than any ever given in Charlottetown. The opening piece, a drama, in three acts, entitled "Dora," was well played. Harry Lindley, as the hard-hearted but penitent Farmer Allen, was A. I. acting throughout perfectly. Miss Helene Adell, as "Dora," performed her part splendidly, and showed that, as an actress, she is a success. Miss Louise Forster, as Mary Morrison, the poor out-cast, gained the sympathy of the audience by her magnificent acting, while the other characters were ably taken by Messrs. Bird, Walsh and Mills. Mlle Nault favored the audience with a few songs which were well received, and Mr. Harry Lindley followed with his song of songs, in which he introduced some very good local hits, and as an encore sang a very good burlesque on Hamlet. The performance concluded with the farce of the "Quiet Family," in which Harry Lindley, as "Barnaby Bibbs," kept the audience in a continual roar of laughter. Miss Helene Adell, as "Mrs. Barnaby," Mr. Albert Taverner and Miss Louise Forster, as Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin, and other characters by the Company, were well played. To night "Miriam's Crime," in which Mr. Lindley will appear as Biles (in which character he has no equal), Songs by Mlle Nault, and Lindley's original creation of the "Weavers," will be the bill of fare, and we hope to see the Market Hall crowded, as it should be.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner. LONDON, April 27. A despatch from Lisbon says Portuguese newspapers assert that Macao is blockaded; that Chinese cruisers captured seventeen vessels in Portuguese waters, and consequently the Lisbon Government have ordered the corvette "Rainha de Portugal" to sail immediately for Macao. Macao is a seaport town and settlement of the Portuguese in China, 70 miles S. S. E. of Canton; population, about 40,000—mostly Chinese.

Bismarck is unable to leave his room. The breach between Parnell and Shaw, Home Rulers, is rapidly widening. The story that American war vessels would be despatched to Canadian waters is purely speculative. Secretary Evarts says he will submit all communications from Lord Salisbury respecting the fisheries question to Congress when called upon. Their contents will not otherwise be disclosed at present.

Prince Leopold's visit to Canada is postponed by reason of his betrothal to a young lady of the British aristocracy. Five members of the Pennsylvania Legislature have been each sentenced to a year's imprisonment in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$1,000 for bribery. A Berlin despatch says Gladstone's accession to power is received there with but little apprehension. Granville's appointment is gratifying to the Germans, as it is thought there will be no radical change in the foreign policy of the Government.
