PC's Pension Plan Promises Criticized By Liberal Speaker

After Conservative spokesmen had been promising everybody over 65 a monthly Old Age Security Pension of \$100, it now develops, "according to Mr. Diefenbaker's own words, that the pledged \$100 will go only to those 70-years-old or older. Liberal candidate for Queen's, Mark B. MacGuigan declared at a meeting at New London last evening, where he was a joint speaker with B. B. Jones, of Banbury, the second Liberal candidate for Queen's.

Both candidates emphasized that they had been in close touch with the four federal cabinet ministers who had visited the Island this week: Health Minister Judy LaMarsh, Public Works Minister MacIvrath, Fisheries Minister Robichaud and Defence Minister Paul Hellyer — "and the worry we get from these men who have been in direct touch with all parts of Canada, is that there is every prospect of a Liberal government being returned on Nov. 8, with a comfortable working majority."

"It is not merely a matter of the Liberals wanting a working majority," Dr. MacGuigan stressed, "it is likewise a matter of Canada needing a majority Liberal government to implement with most of the people of Canada, the far-reaching provisions the Liberals are pledged to bring into effect with respect to such

vital important matters as medicare, the Canada Pension Plan and the proposed new Canada Old Age Assistance Act."

AGREED IN PRINCIPLE

Dr. MacGuigan pointed out that in collaboration with the provinces, and as far as he knew, Prince Edward Island had agreed in principle with the other provinces to the proposed Old Age Assistance Act, which would enable all needy pensioners to receive even up to \$125 a month. "This," he said "would not be handed out as a bribe, but would be the right of every older citizen to get help on the basis of need with provincial collaboration and administration."

In his speech, Mr. Jones referred to the assurance of Fisheries Minister Robichaud, speaking at Rustico Wednesday night, that the desires of the lobster fishermen, as disclosed in their own well conducted plebiscite, would quickly be met.

"All the minister and the government wanted to find out," said Mr. Jones, "was what the fishermen themselves wanted with regard to trap limitation and license restriction. The fishermen themselves have now said what they want, and the minister has replied that a Liberal government will bring into quick effect what they have asked for."

National Art Collection To Have First Showing

Beginning Tuesday, Oct. 26, Confederation Centre Art Gallery will stage the only Canadian showing of a collection regarded as one of the most important ever assembled of Canadian artists.

The collection "fifteen Canadian Artists", contains 60 works valued at more than \$210,000, including eight pieces of sculpture. It has just completed a United States tour which carried it to most of the major cities in that country. Beginning with a showing in the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the exhibition visited St. Louis, San Francisco and many other cit-

ies before completing the tour in Seattle. From that west coast city, the collection travelled direct to Confederation Centre in Charlottetown.

Confederation Centre Gallery director, Moncrieff Williamson, has announced the gallery has been closed until Tuesday evening, Oct. 26, to enable his staff to prepare the "15 Canadian Artists" collection for exhibition.

Reprinted in the collection are works by Canada's foremost artists from many schools. There is the magic realism of Alex Colville, the expressionistic brushwork of Graham Coughtry, the non-objective works of Jean-Paul Riopelle, the dynamic treatment of Harold Town and others which travel the complete range of artistic expression currently to be found in this country.

The Confederation Centre showing has been arranged through the Museum of Modern Art in New York, and Samuel Zuck of Toronto, one of Canada's foremost collectors and art patrons.

Commenting on the exhibition Mr. Williamson waxed enthusiastic, "this is the most important collection of works by Canadians ever to tour the United States," he said, "and it's the most provocative showing Confederation Centre Gallery has had up to now."

ISLANDERS SPECIAL

"We expect that it will attract wide attention among Canadian art experts, and a number are expected to visit the gallery while the collection is on display. I would like to point out, however, that this one could be termed an 'Islanders Special' in that it is being staged first and foremost for Prince Edward Islanders who support our activities the year round."

"I personally hope a good many will make an effort to see the collection, because it represents an illuminating spectrum of Canadian art in the 1950's. It also marks the beginning of our winter program in the gallery."

Alex M. Wilson, Charlottetown has been named the new president of the Canadian Club of Prince Edward Island.

Other officers for the 1965-66 term are: Capt. Claude R. Hunter, Charlottetown, Dr. A.E. Ings, Montague, and Fred Davidson, Kensington vice-presidents for Queens, Kings and Prince respectively.
