Saint Dunstan's University Varsity hockey team stretched its unbeaten streak to three games as they walloped Acadia Axemen 13-4 in a game played at St. Dunstan's Saturday afternoon.

Maurice Roy the MIHL scoring leader came up with his second straight five goal performance. This is the second time that he had had an opportunity to break the school scoring record of five goals in a game held by Billy MacMillan, but he missed numerous opportunities to shatter the old mark.

The Saints opened the scoring with a bang as they romped to a 6-1 lead at the end of the first period. They upped their lead to 9-3 at the end of the second but allowed three Acadia goals in the third. Chicago Moves Into First; Habs, Rangers Triumph

DETROIT (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks scored three first-period goals and went on to defeat Detroit Red Wings 5-1 Sunday night to move into a first-place National Hockey League tie with the Red Wings.

Stan Mikita, Ken Wharram and John Miskuk scored the first-period goals for Chicago, which now has beaten the Red Wings seven times in their nine meetings this season. One game ended in a tie.

Chicago Maki tallied for the Black Hawks in the second period and Eric Nesterenko closed the scoring with a third-period goal.

Paul Henderson scored Detroit's goal in the second period while Chicago was playing two men short.

The Black Hawks have played one more game than the defending regular-season champion Red Wings.

OPENS SCORING
The teams played on even terms until Mikita put the Black Hawks in front at 10:27, taking a pass at the Detroit blue line from Pat Stapleton and firing behind a stretched-out Roger Crozier.

Maki beat Crozier at the 21-second mark of the second period on a point-blank shot after taking a face-off pass from Bobby Hull.

Mahovlich scored twice for the Leafs, bringing his season total to 18 and rookie Brit Selby tallied the other Toronto goal.

The Rangers moved ahead to stay, 4-3, with 59 seconds remaining in the second period on Hadfield's unassisted goal. He stole the puck from Tim Horton inside the Toronto zone and sent a 45-foot blast over Sawchuk's shoulder.
