DROWNED.—A despatch of the 26th ult., from Baltimore, says that Joseph Weagle, of Mich. Jesson, at this port from Prince Edward Island, walked overboard last night and was drowned. He was a native of I. N. S., aged 28, and leaves a wife and child in his native place. His body was recovered to-day. NEW YEAR'S night there was a grand march led by the Gospel Army, and a crowded meeting at the barracks and general roll call of members. Capt. Mallory gave notice that at all meetings of the Army good order would in the future be rigidly enforced. Tonight Capt. Howell and Barlett are expected to re-enforce the Army. On Sunday there will be three meetings as usual, 7 a. m., 4 p. m., and 8 p. m. Dr. WARBURTON was today relieved from further duties as Assistant Health Officer. Since the outbreak of the epidemic he has been on duty day and night, attending on those stricken with the disease, cleansing the infected houses, and making infected districts safe for the inhabitants to live in. Dr. Warburton's patrons will be glad to see him in his old place again. FLYING SQUIRREL.—One day last week Mr. E. L. Strang, of Sealton, saw a flying squirrel jump from a tree and run into a hollow log. Mr. Strang at once took possession of the entrance to the log, and finally captured the squirrel which he kept alive until Thursday last, when it died while en route to visit our sanctum. These animals are very rare in this country, and the one captured by Mr. Strang was a beautiful specimen, the fur being long and very fine.—Journal. The tendency of population to move westward is strongly illustrated in the state of Maine, which, it is claimed by a recent publication issued by the State Department, has contributed 180,000 of her people to build up other states of the Union. Too much of this drain has, unfortunately, been made up by drafts from the Canadian Provinces, as out of the 684,856 set forth as the total number of inhabitants, of whom 59,000 are classed as foreigners, 35,565 are from the Dominion, 19,000 coming from Quebec, 15,955 from New Brunswick and 3,774 from Nova Scotia. A NUMBER of the members of the Methodist congregation on the Tryon Circuit met at the Parsonage on the 14th inst., and spent a most enjoyable Christmas Eve. The pleasant occasion in which all were engaged was suddenly interrupted by J. M. Hood, who, on behalf of the congregations at Tryon, Augustine Cove and Cape Traverse, presented Rev. George Harrison with a beautiful buffalo robe. This robe, Matthew Smith, Esq., on behalf of the congregations at Cranand, Victoria and Hampton, also presented him with a superior black fur coat. Mr. Harrison's surprise cannot be described, and he said it was impossible to find words to express his thankfulness for such kind favors. MESSRS. (SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER) Home Rule. LONDON, Jan. 1. Sir Charles Dilke in a speech last night said he was in favor of extending Trevelyan's Irish scheme to the three Kingdoms. The Conservatives said ought to propose a scheme first, and if that should be rejected by Parliament Gladstone would speak as leader of the whole liberal party. DUBLIN, Jan. 1. The United Ireland is still hopeful of having home rule from the Tories. LONDON, Jan. 1. A number of liberal members of the Commons have been privately making overtures to Parnell with the object of having him make a proposition for home rule. This Parnell does not seem inclined to do. Promoted. LONDON, Jan. 1. Sir Frederick Leighton, President of the Royal Academy, has been promoted. General Wolsey starts for Berlin to-morrow to represent Queen Victoria at the Emperor William's jubilee on Jan. 3. The English Channel Tunnel. LONDON, Jan. 1. The Government has intimated an intention of opposing the passage of the Bill providing for the construction of the tunnel under the English Channel, between England and France. Great Fire. DETROIT, Jan. 1. A business square was burned here to-day, loss, \$1,500,000. The mammoth building of D. M. Ferry & Co., soda-man, with contents, valued at \$1,200,000, was destroyed. The Balkan War. LONDON, Jan. 1. It is said when the Serbian troops evacuated Widdin district they devastated the country and looted the cattle and corn belonging to the Bulgarian farmers. Burmah Annexed. RANGOON, Jan. 1. A proclamation, announcing the annexation of Burmah to the British Empire, was read to-day. England cedes to China parts of Upper Burmah. Religious Reform. CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 1. It is stated that Russia insists that Turkey shall fulfil the article in the Berlin Treaty providing for the execution of religious reform in Armenia. Converted into Cash. ROME, Jan. 1. The Pope has converted personal presents of many years into money, and has donated the proceeds, 20,000 pounds to the College of the Propaganda. The Dilke Scandal. LONDON, Jan. 1. PATIENTS AT THE HOSPITAL. Dr. Jenkins yesterday made the following report: To the Chairman of the Board of Health. Sir,—I have to report the discharge to-day of Mr. Thompson, Walter Thompson, Mrs. Larter, Bridget Manley and Mrs. Carr (nurse). Miss Ann O'Hare was discharged as a patient, but retained as a nurse. There are now four adults and two children, Mrs. Began, Kate Began, Mary Morral and two children and James Keenan. They have been ready to leave for some days, but have no homes to go to. I hope a place will be found for the Begans to-morrow, as I do not wish any patients to remain after the week. Of assistants, there are besides Mr. Jennings Stephen O'Hare, Frank O'Hare, James McQuillan, Mrs. Chilton, Mrs. McInnis, and Mary Ann O'Hare. These will remain till the building is cleared. To the Chairman of the Board of Health: Sir,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of a copy of a resolution passed by your Board on the 30th inst., in which you resolve that Dr. Johnson shall take charge of the smallpox hospital. I am under the impression that in my reply to your last resolution on this subject, I stated I had decided in the interests of the public to retain the charge of that institution, which might have been done to-day had your Board provided sufficient change of clothing and house accommodation and the building put in a fit condition to be handed over to the authorities. Your resolutions are not likely to alter my decision. They were merely to expose the ignorance and folly of the few who are their authors, and to render them, in the eyes of the public, objects of contempt and ridicule. I have &c., J. T. JENKINS. His Grace, Archbishop O'Brien. On today, (2nd inst.) His Grace, Archbishop O'Brien, will take passage in the Parisian on route to the Eternal City, to pay the customary visit to the tombs of the Apostles. His Grace will thus come into the presence of the Sovereign Pontiff for the first time in his archiepiscopal character, and will have the distinguished privilege of being introduced as the youngest Archbishop in the Catholic Church. This means much; for the Church of Rome is most exacting in regard to the qualifications of those whom it selects for its higher dignities; and when the pallium is conferred upon a comparatively young clergyman it may be accepted as evidence that he considered exceptionally worthy of the distinction. Those who know Archbishop O'Brien, those who have noted his course of action since he succeeded the late respected Archbishop Hannan, will readily concede that he has proved himself well deserving of the high favor extended to him by the Holy See, and has illustrated the wisdom which so generally marks its choice of prelates. Irrespective of his distinguished ability as a scholar and a Divine, he has displayed great activity and energy in promoting the interests of the archdiocese generally. No portion of it has been overlooked, and there are few if any, he has not personally visited. He has thus become familiar with the wants of the entire flock entrusted to him, and is supplying them as far as he can. Among the many monuments to his zeal that can be pointed to, we may mention, in an especial manner, that splendid specimen of ecclesiastical architecture, St. Patrick's Church, which was opened for services on Sunday last, and which gives to the Catholic population of the north-end of the city, instead of the tumble-down structure in which they worshipped two years ago, one of the most thoroughly built and commodious and, at the same time, one of the handsomest edifices in the Lower Provinces. His Grace leave us in the best of health and spirits. We trust his journey and visit to Rome may be pleasant and profitable, and that he may return safely to resume his discharged so faithfully and successfully. His Grace is accompanied by Rev. George Ellis, one of the most deservedly popular and excellent priests in the diocese. His health has been somewhat impaired for the last year or two; on which he is about to embark will tend to his complete restoration.
