AN ELECTION DEAL.

Purchase of Kingston Locomotive Works.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—On the eve of the election the government has made a deal with which it is proposed to capture Kingston.

The Kingston locomotive works, which have been closed for many months and which formerly employed 400 hands, have been purchased from the Bank of Montreal for \$75,000. The Hon. William Harty has been in town for several days negotiating the deal, and several days ago offered \$65,000 for the works. The Bank refused to sell for a cent less than \$75,000 and that cash down. Mr. Harty hesitated until this afternoon, and finally agreed to pay the amount and did so.

Immediately afterwards, he went to the long-distance telephone and notified Kingston. He gave instructions before to have the fires started tomorrow morning and he stated that he had an order from Mr. Blair for twenty locomotives.

The Grits think this will be enough to buy Kingston. It remains for the electors of Canada to show, tomorrow, if they can be bribed with their own money. The Kingston works would not have been compelled to shut down had Mr. Blair given the concern orders between elections. He then gave the orders to the American locomotive works.

REWARD FOR KHAKI HEROES.

TORONTO, Nov. 6.—At the last session of the legislature, Mr. E. D. Little, M. P. P. for Cardwell, a member of the Conservative Opposition, proposed that the Ontario Government recompense the soldiers of this province who have fought in South Africa out of the public lands of the province. The Hon. George Ross, on behalf of the government, promised to adopt Mr. Little's suggestion, and he now proposes to give 160 acres of the public lands of New Ontario to every soldier who went from this province.

BRITISH CABINET CHANGES.

New Chief Secretary for Ireland.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Times announces that Mr. Geo. Wyndham, who was Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for War in the late Cabinet, will probably be appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland. It is also likely that Mr. Walter Hume Long, who was President of the Board of Agriculture, will become President of the Local Government Board, and that Mr. Robert William Hanbury, who was Financial Secretary to the Treasury, will be given the Postmaster Generalship, with a seat in the Cabinet. According to the same authority, the Marquis of Londonderry will be appointed President of the Board of Agriculture, and Mr. Austin Chamberlain will be removed from the post of Civil Lord of the Admiralty to that of Financial Secretary to the Treasury. For minor posts Mr. Hugh Oakley Arnold Forster, Lord Stanley and Lord Cranborne, eldest son of the Premier, are named. It is probable that Earl Cadogan, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, will defer his resignation for some months.

The seals of office will be exchanged at a Council to be held at Windsor Castle, Nov. 12.

REPUBLICANS TRIUMPHANT.

McKinley and His Friends are Again in Power.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Jubilation over the McKinley election, last night, broke all bounds.

According to the returns now in, Mr. McKinley has a big majority. If all the unreported states should turn out Democratic, it would not change the result.

BOSTON, Nov. 7.—As usual, in presidential years, Massachusetts went Republican by a substantial majority, giving to McKinley fifteen votes in electoral college, while Murray Crane was re-elected Governor.

All of the Republican state ticket and at least ten out of thirteen of the Republican Congress men have been elected.

The State legislature is also Republican by a majority of three to one.

McKinley's plurality in the State is about 80,000, a reduction of nearly 100,000 from four years ago.

The Republicans captured the Nebraska legislature, and New York gives McKinley a plurality of a hundred thousand.

OUR BOYS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

McLeod played "full-back" during the first half and "three-quarter, left" in the second. A ROYAL HEROINE.

The Queen of Portugal Saves the Life of Her Boatman.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The Queen of Portugal, at Cascais, a fashionable seaside resort, made a thrilling rescue, and is now a heroine in the eyes of all her subjects, says a Lisbon despatch to the Journal and Advertiser. The Queen was on the beach idly watching Catalao Croom, her boatman, bringing his boat ashore. Suddenly a wave overturned the boat. Croom's arm was broken, and he was overcome by the undertow. The Queen, who is an expert swimmer, seeing that he was drowning, sprang into the sea in her clothing before any of her attendants could prevent her. She swam to the boatman's side and kept him afloat until the persons on the shore put out in boats and rescued both. Croom was taken to the royal palace where he is being nursed by the Queen. She is none the worse for her experience.

DESPERATE METHODS

Of Desperate Men—Found Out.

MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—An indication of the desperate nature of the situation can be gathered from the fact which came out in the court yesterday, that the Laurierites have tried to get naturalization papers for a large number of Italians, Chinese and Romanians. Being objected to, the parties were summoned when it was found that forgery had been resorted to, the parties not having made application.

If naturalization were granted the names being on the list impersonators would be run for the Government candidates. The sum of \$10,000 has been put in the hands of R. D. McGibbon, C., to bring to justice those who attempt to violate the law, and the Canadian secret service is engaging a large number of able-bodied men to aid their regular detective force engaged to watch the polls.

Strenuous efforts will be made to smash the machine.

BUDDHIST DEVOTION.

According to Yokohama advices, the Buddhists of Japan are making great efforts to celebrate the beginning of the new century by active missionary work. The recent arrival of some sacred relics from Siam was made the occasion of an extraordinary demonstration of devotion to the faith. The roads over which the relics were borne were covered with cloth, which was afterwards sold in small pieces at more than ten times its value, realizing over 62,000 yen. They propose to collect 1,000 yen and to erect a grand building as a repository for their treasures. After this has been done they intend to turn their attention to charity and education.
