an increase in foreign control over portions of Canadian industry. Most of this foreign debt is in the hands of American investors. In some political and economic quarters, the rise in foreign ownership of Canadian concerns has been viewed with alarm. But in the eyes of the federal government, the situation is not considered serious.

However, the bureau observed that Canada's net foreign indebtedness has more than doubled in the last six years to \$7,700,000,000 at the end of 1955 from 3,700,000,000 in 1949.

By mid-1956, it said, the debt probably increased by another \$800,000,000 to a high of 8,500,000,000.

This investment has resulted in a great growth in productive capacity, said the bureau, "but the resulting liability represents increasing ownership and control by non-residents of Canadian industry."

It also represented "an increasing claim on the income of the country which may be expected to lead in the future to sharply increased payments abroad on income account."

The rise in ownership results from the heavy imports of capital to finance Canada's huge economic expansion and record purchases of goods from the U.S. and other countries.

TWICE 1955 FIGURE
In the first six months of 1956, net imports of capital rose to \$771,000,000, more than double the \$348,000,000 in the similar 1955 period. This capital financed Canada's deficit in record international trade in goods and services.

In the direct investment field, Canadians also have been active abroad, particularly in the U. S. total net investment abroad rose to \$6,000,000 in the January-June period, compared with 17,000,000 in the similar half of 1955. More than one-half of the \$50,000,000 moved to the U.S.

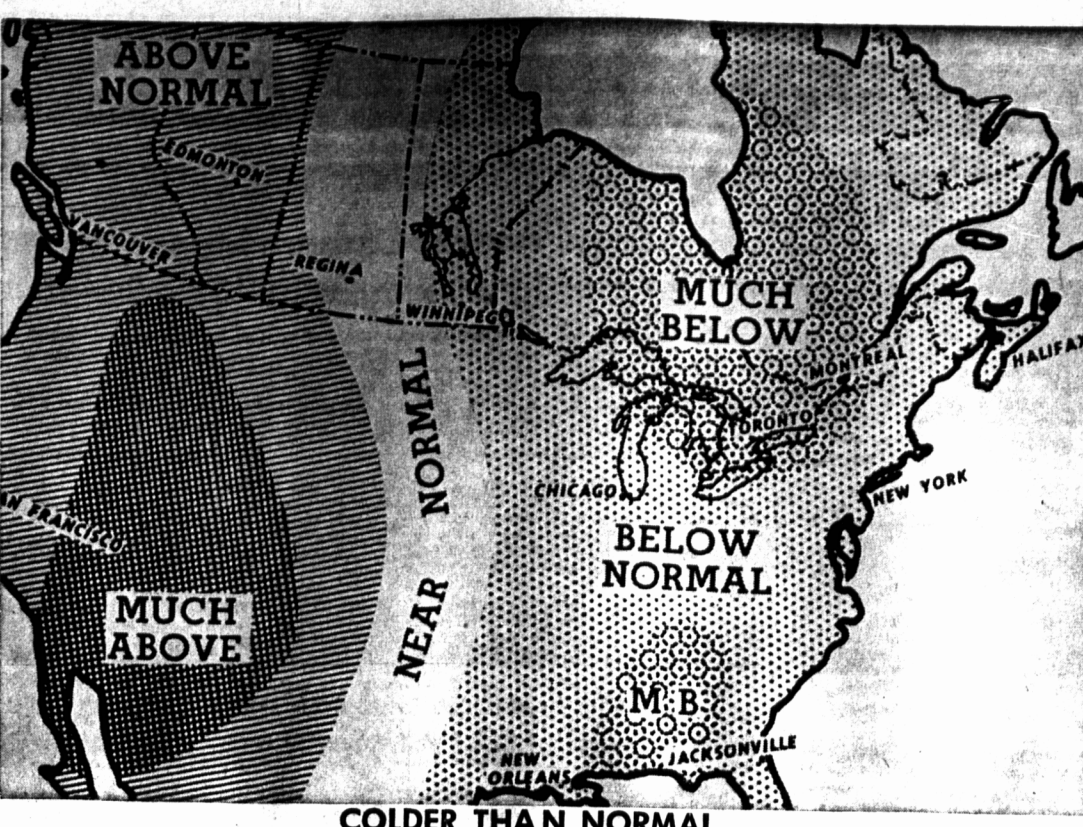
