

## Wisecrack Cost Official Suspension From His Job

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government's unemployment insurance commission is awaiting the report of an appeal board dealing with the suspension of an official in its office at Sydney, N.S., for making a wisecrack about the wife of Nova Scotia Minister E. A. Manson.

The official—Michael McCormick, Supervisor of employment—was ordered suspended for a week last month because he suggested facetiously in the commission's office that Mrs. Manson was the person to see about getting work on a provincial highway project on Grand Lake Road near Sydney.

Sydney is the hometown of the Mansons.

The suspension order came from the commission here after a report on the incident had been received from the commission's regional office, officials said today.

On appeal from Mr. McCormick, the commission set up a board to hear his case. The board will report to headquarters of the commission which can either accept or reject its recommendation.

## Billy Graham Completes His Summer Crusade In New York

NEW YORK (AP) — Billy Graham transformed the environs of Times Square into a massive open-air church Sunday night at the windup of his summer-long New York crusade.

A huge throng stood hushed as loudspeakers carried the evangelist's plea to "seek Christ." The crowd stood shoulder to shoulder from building to building.

Gospel songs rang out at the busy crossroads which usually echoes with juke box jive. Business went on as usual in nearby bars, restaurants and theatres.

As Graham concluded his sermon he asked for a show of hands by those who would dedicate their lives to Christ. Thousands waved in the gathering dusk.

Graham said:  
"Here in Times Square is the dope addict, the alcoholic, the harlot — along with the finest citizens of the world. It is primarily a place of amusement, money-making, drinking, eating and making merry."

"Tonight for a few moments it is being turned into a great cathedral as a symbol of spiritual revival that is now a progress in the United States. Let us tell the world tonight that we Americans believe in God."

Graham estimated during his talk that 200,000 persons were in the crowd, but Chief Inspector Thomas A. Nielson of the police department estimated the crowd at 75,000.

## Krupp Looks Into Labrador

ESSEN, Germany (AP) — Informed sources said Thursday Alfred Krupp, West German steel magnate, will go to Canada this month on a mission aimed at exploiting iron ore fields in the Ungava region of Quebec.

Sources said Krupp will confer with Canadian-born industrialists to develop a partnership to develop mines just south of Ungava Bay.

Krupp is the former German began negotiations aimed at establishing such a partnership, the sources said, adding that no definite agreements have yet been reached.

Krupp is the former German munitions king who was sent to prison by the allies for war crimes. The vast Krupp industrial empire largely equipped German armies in two world wars.

### NO MUNITIONS

Krupp is prohibited from returning to the munitions business.

Informed sources in this German steel capital said the reason for Krupp's interest in Canadian ore is the little-known fact that supplies of Swedish iron ore — used by the factories of the Ruhr — have been declining.

Industry sources say German ore is not sufficiently high-grade for German needs.

Krupp plans to leave for Canada Sept. 18 and remain there until Oct. 13, when he will go to San Francisco to make one of the principal speeches at an annual international industrial development conference.
