## CONTRACT BRIDGE

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

This hand was played in New York in the 1956 masters team of four championship.

Harold Ogust, playing with Boris Koytchou, opened with a club. West doubled, naturally enough, and North redoubled. When this came around to West, he bid a diamond over which Koytchou had a heart.

Ogust had a good hand, but decided to bid only two clubs.

The heart bid hadn't helped much, since he was void of the suit, and he was furthermore confident there would be more bidding.

There was. West bid two diamonds and Koytchou bid three diamonds to show a void. Ogust, under wraps up to this point, jumped to six clubs. The cuebid had implied at least moderate support for clubs.

East had every reason to believe that six clubs would be made and took the unusual step of bidding six diamonds as a vulnerable sacrifice against non-vulnerable opponents.

Ogust promptly bid seven clubs. He was unwilling to settle for what appeared to be a relatively small penalty when he thought there was a good chance of making a grand slam.

West led a diamond and Ogust had no trouble making 13 tricks. He trumped three diamonds in dummy and discarded one on the ace of hearts.

Point count didn't mean much in the hand. The combined North-South count came to only 22 high-card points. West had a solid 18 points and East had everything that was left.

In our view, West made a bad opening lead. He should have realized, holding 18 points, that the opponents were bidding largely on distribution and had undertaken a grand slam in the expectation of making it against the normal diamond lead. It was clear on the bidding that dummy would show up void of diamonds.

West should therefore have led a trump in order to put down dummy's ruffing power. If he had done this, he would have defeated the contract.
