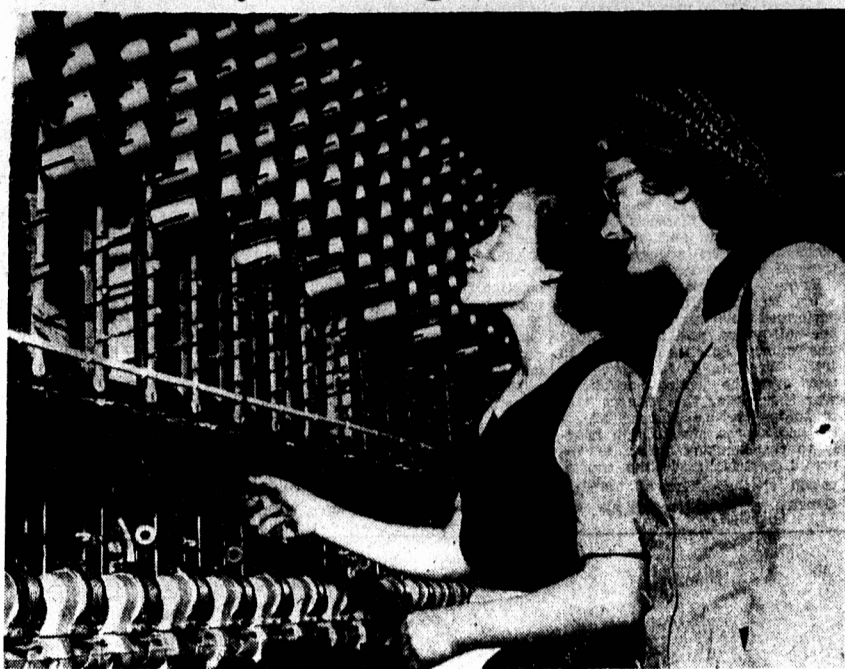

Home Destroyed By Morning Fire At Southampton

The home of Mr. Herbert MacLeod, Southampton, was completely destroyed yesterday morning when fire broke out in the attic.

Mr. MacLeod noticed smoke around the flu early in the morning and put it out himself. At 8 o'clock he again opened the door to check and found the attic blazing.

St. Peter's Fire Department was called but was unable to save the building, and all household items were lost but a few lighter articles which were rushed from the ground floor. Two hundred dollars in cash which had been upstairs was also burned.

New Industry Being Developed

This year a new industry, which should bring a cash to farmers, is being tried out in the Montague area of King's County.

Early in the Spring a representative of the Canadian Canning Co., Middlesex, N. S., visited the Island, and contracted with various farmers in the district to grow beans for canning.

As it is an experimental venture the individual acreage is low, ranging from one quarter to one acre per farmer. The beans are planted as a row crop, either in drills or on the flat, about 30 inches apart. It requires about sixty pounds of seed to plant an acre and the seed is treated to control insects and disease.

The beans are picked just before the bean forms in the pod, at which time they are in the right condition for canning. They are packed in baskets and delivered to a weighing station in Montague, operated by Mr. Cecil Bell.

From there the beans will be trucked to the canning plant. Both the wax and green pod varieties are grown.
