**Seek Opinion On Punishment**

VANCOUVER (CP) — Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be asked to consider whether capital punishment should be retained or abolished so the church can form an official opinion.

The 83rd general assembly of the church voted Thursday at its final session to refer the subject to the presbyteries and ask them to report their views to the board of evangelism and social service during the coming year.

It was told that a special committee on capital punishment was unable to present any findings because of the departure for duty in Asia of Professor Donald V. Wade of Knox College, Toronto.

The assembly exchanged greetings with the Anglican synod of New Westminster, now in session, before being adjourned by Moderator Rev. Archibald D. MacKinnon of Little Narrows, N.S.

**Maritime Council Of Catholic Nurses Sessions Continued**

On Thursday morning at the Charlottetown Hospital, Father Joseph Mills, Chaplain for the Catholic nurses, addressed the members. He complimented the various member guilds on their accomplishments during the past two years. His reports evinced the serious nature of their response to resolve the nursing shortage, appreciation for the hospitality of the Guild of St. Veronica and said that the dialogue Mass and offertory procession would be a lasting beautiful memory for him. He entertained the hope that the dialogue Mass might be an annual event and thanked the Guild of St. Veronica for their original thinking in planning this lovely service.

One of the highlights of yesterday's meeting was an explanation of the "Grail Movement" by Miss Genevieve MacDonald, R.N., and Miss Ellen Mullally, R.N. They pointed out that it is an international lay apostolate movement at work in fifteen countries of the world. Its purpose is to unite the talents and energies of young women of every race and nation to help turn society again in a Godward direction.

Today's young woman must be equipped to face a world abundant in material things but lacking in spiritual values. She must be equipped with a sense of compassion; wise in technical skills but wanting in dedication. There is in our country today a pressing need for varied programs of family assistance, educational, recreational and practical. The Grail movement is being developed by a new apostolic career called "Family Service". The members are taught a healthy respect and appreciation for the work of the home maker and the skills and talents demanded of the woman who adequately fulfills her task. As the family movement grows, more and more people will see the role of wife and mother as a tremendous important one. Besides serving a community need in case of family emergency when the husband is absent, young women are preparing for their own future success in marriage and motherhood.

**SCHOLARLY ADDRESS**

During the morning session the members were privileged to hear a scholarly address on "Psychiatry and Religion" by Dr. John Theriault.

Dr. Theriault pointed out that "God has set down rules that form a standard by which a person's actions must be judged as morally right or morally wrong. These rulings are irrevocable and eternal, the ruling is the objective norm of morality. Those who do not agree to the existence of an ultimate God, bring up another theory or theories to govern right or wrong such as: society, traditions, customs etc. But these theories are man made. Unfortunately for these people they can never realize that it is not possible for the finite man to understand God, as God is infinite. We are limited by our anatomical brains, the number of cells therein, the fluid it contains, the electrical and the blood flowing through it. Since all these have organic limitations, our minds are limited in their powers. This factor, of course, the intelligent man accepts. Too often unfortunately, men in a scientific sphere, such as physics or chemistry, men in military science, in medical science or political science while delivering an address may state that they do not understand God, therefore they do not believe in God. Usually if that person is one of influence, he will be quoted as an authority, not in his own sphere, but in the sphere of ethics and religion. The fact that such a person does not understand God is no proof that he does not exist, for as mentioned the finite cannot understand the infinite.

The psychiatrist or psychotherapist must on no account impress his philosophy on others. He should be aware of religious values and he should have a knowledge of his patient's religious background. He should be well versed in his own religion and certainly have insight into the religious beliefs of others. The psychiatrist must practice within his own realm and not try to take over from the clergy.

The appliance of each and every type of medical treatment, whether it be psychiatric, medical or surgical, will be overshadowed by the basic teaching of the Church on man, his nature and his destiny. "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world if he should lose his own soul?" Dr. Theriault was introduced by Miss Genevieve MacDonald, R.N. and thanked by Mrs. Mary Mad-

**Left Estate Of 31 Million Dollars**

LONDON (Reuters) — The late James Armand Edmond de Rothschild, art connoisseur, farmer, racehorse owner and former member of Parliament, left a fortune of £11,137,410 (\$31,000,000) it was announced here Wednesday. He died last month at 78.

It is the largest estate left in Britain in recent years. Only the Duke of Bedford and the Duke of Westminster, who both died in 1953, left estates of more than £5,000,000.

Death duties will take about 70 per cent of the fortune, a levy of £7,570,029.

After substantial bequests the residue including his racing interests go to his widow. There are no children.

De Rothschild, son of Baron Edmond de Rothschild of Paris, left his country home, Waddesdon Manor in Buckinghamshire, one of the biggest and most luxurious private houses in Britain, to the same with a fund for his upkeep.

**Would Cling To Office?**

MONTREAL (CP)—The Gazette says in a dispatch from Ottawa that cabinet ministers in reported determined to stay in office.

The story, written by the newspaper's parliamentary correspondent Arthur Blackly, says: "While Prime Minister St. Laurent chatted briefly with reporters Thursday night following the Liberal cabinet meeting 'reports spread—and gathered strength—that a small minority of cabinet members were trying to persuade the government to adopt the course followed by Mackenzie King in 1926 — to stay stubbornly in office until defeated in Parliament on a want-of-confidence motion.'"

The story says Mr. St. Laurent and most of his cabinet colleagues are reported against the idea.

**Refutes Claim Of Tory Tieup With Big Business**

OTTAWA (CP) — A Western Canadian historian said today the conception that the Conservative party was particularly susceptible to the will and influence of big business was kept alive by former Liberal Prime Minister Mackenzie King long after it ceased to be a fact.

Professor W. R. Graham of the University of Saskatchewan, in a paper to a meeting of the Canadian Historical Association, cited the 1921 general election which toppled the Conservative government of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen. He said the association of conservatives and big business in the popular mind was substantially true when first propounded by William Lyon Mackenzie during the 1820s.

But when perpetuated a century later in "the shapeless verbosity of his grandiose" William Lyon Mackenzie King, it was "nothing more than a collection of demagogic shibboleths, sanctified by incessant ritualistic repetition."

Professor Graham said that in 1921 Meighen incurred the opposition of Sir Edward Beatty, president of the CPR and other "Mont-
