THE DOMINION EXHIBITION OPENED ON SATURDAY

At Halifax By Lieut. Governor Fraser—Grounds Much Improved, But Much Work Yet to be Done on Many Booths—Horse Races Begin today—Entries Large and Island Well Represented—Military Tattoo This Evening.

HALIFAX, September 23—(Special)—The big Dominion Exhibition opened here today, and there was a large attendance. Since the last exhibition the grounds have been very materially improved and several new buildings have been added to the equipment. In fact it is doubtful if there is any place east of Ottawa better adapted for the holding of the Dominion fair.

The entry list in all the classes is large, and Prince Edward Island is well represented. This afternoon, after the formal opening proceedings, the horse show was held in front of the grand stand, and the exhibition was a most attractive feature. There was a good field of entries in the different classes and many choice specimens of horse flesh were to be seen.

The horse races begin on Monday, and the program for the opening day will consist of the 217 foot and pace, the two year old stake race and the three minute stake. The racing program will cover nine days, and the entry list includes the fastest movers in the provinces and a string of swift ones from across the border.

MUCH ESTEEMED MONCTON GROCER

Kenneth A McLean Died Saturday Evening—A Month Unconscious.

MONCTON, Sept. 23—(Special)—After lying for a month unconscious and recognising no one, Kenneth A. McLean, a well-known local merchant, died last evening. Deceased was forty-six years of age and had lived in Moncton all his life. He conducted a grocery business on Main Street and was a highly esteemed citizen.

ATLANTA WILD OVER ASSAULTS

Upon White Women, Negroes Killed, Riot Quelled But May Recur.

ATLANTA, Sept. 23.—(Special)—Five assaults on white women by negroes were made here Saturday, all within the city limits. Wild indignation resulted in a race war in the streets in which several negroes were killed and many whites wounded. The riots were quelled but may break out again as the lawless element is greatly excited. Martial law may be proclaimed.

TWO WERE SAVED ONLY SURVIVORS

Of a Schooner Wreck, Without Food for Four Days on Raft

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 23.—(Special)—Two sailors in a terrible condition, were picked up off a raft at sea after floating without food or water except three small fishes from Monday morning till Thursday night, and landed here Saturday by steamer Egda. They are the only survivors of the schooner Nelson E. Newbery of New York, foundered at sea. They were passed by fifteen steamers before they were rescued.

TO PROLONG NAVIGATION

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Tenders are being asked by the marine department for open boats to endeavor to keep navigation open from Fort Arthur and Port William as late as possible this fall. Next spring an experiment will be tried by ice breaking to permit navigation starting earlier than otherwise would be the case.

THE COMMANDER AS DEFENDANT

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Judge Anglin will open the high court of Ontario jury sittings in the Ottawa court house next Tuesday. Among the cases listed for trial, Commander Spain is the defendant. Through W. B. A. Ritchie, acting as trustee for Mary Beatrice Spain, suit is made for \$1,200, being six quarterly allowances of \$200 each, alleged to be in arrears, the allowances being provided for in an agreement between plaintiff and defendant. She claims \$1,250, alleging it is owing her for insurance premiums paid, and money loaned to her husband. She claims to have loaned \$6,000 and that but \$1,750 has been paid.

MANY WHALERS CAUGHT IN ICE

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—A report received today at the mounted police department from Sergeant Howard, in charge of the post on Herchel Island at the mouth of the Mackenzie river, Arctic ocean, says that of the 500 American whalers caught in the ice in this remote region last fall, only one had perished during the winter. When this letter was written in the month of May, deer meat was coming in and the whalers were assured of sufficient food to last till the arrival of relief. They would get out of the ice, it was thought, on July 8 and return to meet the supply boat on August 10.

I.C.R. MEN GET INCREASED PAY

MONCTON, N. B. Sept. 21.—The minister of railways spent today in the I. C. R. offices taking up the question of pay to the junior clerks. A number of increases have been granted to the stenographers and they range from \$5 to \$15. It is stated that the junior machinists in the shops are also to get increases at once. T. C. Burpee's salary as engineer of maintenance has been increased to the amount paid W. B. McKenzie. Four district superintendents are also to get increase of \$300 each per annum. The announcement was made recently that no general increase would be granted clerks till the end of the fiscal year, therefore, the news came as a glad surprise to the officials and junior clerks, the latter being considered underpaid.

THE CONFERENCE ON SATURDAY

FREDERICTON, Sept. 21.—(Special)—The Convention of Kings Daughters opened here this morning in the Church of England hall. About fifty delegates were present. Miss Helen Barker, Provincial Secretary, called the gathering to order and Miss Jean Cooper extended a welcome to the visitors. Appropriate and suitable responses were made by Mrs. Vaughan, St. John, Miss Brown, Toronto, Miss Mellish, Charlottetown and Miss Stearns, Halifax. The secretary's report showed the order to be showed the order to be in a flourishing condition. Total membership is now 327 and increase of 33 over last year.

CUBAN TROUBLE NEAR ITS END

Rebel Leaders In Conference, But United States Marines May Land.

HAVANA, Sept. 23.—(Special)—Fifteen hundred marines and sailors are preparing to land in Havana. The object of landing these troops is stated to be preparedness to resist a possible attack on the city and to be ready to protect American lives and property in the event that the rebels shall capture the city. It is significant fact that the Cuban Government has ordered the transportation of the troops and made all arrangements for their occupation of Camp Columbia. Indications late tonight are that the end to the Cuban trouble is near and that peace will be attained without the intervention of U. S. Secretary of War Taft and Assistant Secretary of State Bacon. Upwards of a score of leaders of the revolution held a conference tonight and it was announced that the latter had appointed a committee to represent the Liberals in conference. The leaders told Secretary Taft that they would agree to abide the judgment of the conference.

COCAINE HABIT IS PREVALENT

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 21.—The prevalence of the cocaine habit among young men in this city has reached so serious a stage that Dr. P. P. Drake has publicly asked the authorities to take steps to prevent its further spread. Scores of young men are victims of the drug and there is scarcely a physician in the city but has several severe cases under his care.
