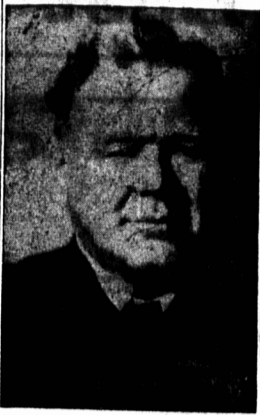


Stresses Importance Of Servicing Secondary Roads

The importance of a snow removal in the secondary roads was stressed in the Legislature yesterday by Mr. George E. Saville (Liberal, Fifth Kings), who said that since the greater majority of people depend upon auto traffic and that "people can get sick on the side roads just as easily as on the main road" every effort should be made to keep these roads clear.

He agreed that it would take quite an addition to the existing snow removal equipment as well as to the staff of operators and servicemen but felt that the spending of money in this direction was necessary and warranted.

Speaking on the Draft Address, Mr. Saville said that "under modern conditions, a country without good roads is not modernized at all." He believed that for the quality of materials available on the Island, the roads were good. He noted that many of the roads in his district had been widened from 50-66 feet and that with efficient engineers it was possible to get a lot of work done. This, he said, was most important in the district he represents since there is only 2 1/2 miles of railway in the whole area and everything has to be moved by truck. "This is one of the reasons we should get plenty of work done since we use a great deal more gasoline and thus pay a larger gas tax," he said.

Mr. Saville said he was glad to see the Trans-Canada Highway being brought to a conclusion. He was inclined to believe that a great deal of work had been diverted from the ordinary roads in order to carry out construction of the Trans-Canada.

The King's member told the house that this past year was a very hard year on the clay roads which broke down under continuous wet weather. Through an experiment with one of the graders he personally found out that the best solution for making such a road firm, was to use the machine to haul the clay from the shoulder of the road into the centre. "This," he said, "had a tendency to fill up the low places in the middle that were holding the water and cause it to drain off to either side."

Hay crops now seen on the Island were a result of this policy.

The honey industry, the bounty on racoons and skunks, and the supplying of brooders for the raising of chicks were some of the things for which the Department had been responsible. "Look at our Island hogs, they have the highest record in Canada and considered the best in the world."

"The Minister may not be spending all the money voted for his department but I can't see that any department's efficiency can be measured by the amount of money they spend," said Mr. Saville.

"I don't consider myself qualified to talk on this subject but one cannot go through the country and not admire our beautiful schools that have been built with Government assistance without feeling proud," Mr. Saville continued. "They are a dream which we thought could never exist."

Teacher's salaries, he thought were too low but pointed out that they were much higher than 25 years ago. He expressed the hope that salaries would be raised in the near future.

Also surviving are two brothers, Milton at Montague, and Frank a patient in the Veterans Annex of the Prince Edward Island Hospital; and three sisters, Minnie (Mrs. Richard Campbell) of Calgary, Alberta; Mildred, (Mrs. Benjamin Spataza), Shelter Island, New York; and Gracie, (Mrs. Theodore MacLean), Montague.

Two brothers, Ernest and Albert, predeceased him.

The funeral was held on Monday, February 14.
