

# Sudden Death At Summerside Of Mr. Melville L. Bradshaw

Three passed away at his Summerside home on Dominion Day, Mr. Melville Lawson Bradshaw in his 70th year. Though not enjoying his usual good health for the past four months Mr. Bradshaw felt exceptionally well on Monday morning and spent the forenoon in a visit to his summer cottage at Stanley Bridge.

The late Mr. Bradshaw was born at New Glasgow, P.E.I. on the 16th of December, 1879, the son of the late Robert and Harriet (Bagnall) Bradshaw. At an early age he came to Summerside and became associated with the late Captain Joseph Read in the coal and produce business. After Captain Read's death he became the head of Joseph Read and Company Limited and continued to be active manager of the company for the rest of his life. The company grew to be one of the largest produce firms on the Island.

Mr. Bradshaw was also actively associated as a director of Associated Shippers Inc.

The deceased was a very public spirited citizen, having been a member of the Summerside School Board, the Prince County Hospital Board of which he was vice-chair-

man and finance chairman at the time of the campaign to build the new hospital. The Summerside Rotary Club and the Summerside Curling Club.

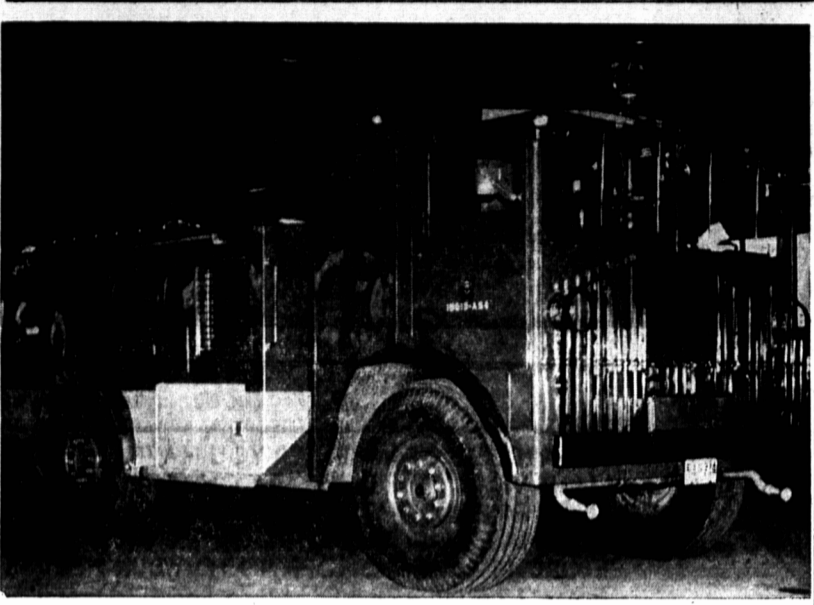
In politics he was an ardent Liberal, in religion he was a devoted member of the church of Christ, fraternally he was a Mason and had attained 32 degrees in the Scottish rite.

Mr. Bradshaw was predeceased over six years ago by his wife, the former Elythea Read. He is survived by three daughters of Summerside and Mrs. Donald S. Bailor of Ottawa, also by seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

There also survives three sisters, Mrs. Leslie Weeks of Elliotts, Mrs. Henry Boss of Stanley River and Mrs. (Dr.) Burdette Stevenson, now of Charlottetown; also a half-sister, Mrs. George Dickieson of Vancouver, and three half-brothers, George Dickieson, Alder Dickieson and Richard Dickieson of New Glasgow.

The late Mr. Bradshaw will be greatly missed by all who knew him and sincere sympathy is extended to his sorrowing family.

# Brooklyn Resident 90, Born 4 Days Before Confederation

Mr. Fred Wells of Brooklyn, near Alberton, celebrated his 90th birthday on Thursday, June 27th.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. James Wells (nee Martha McRae), he was born on the farm now owned by Mr. William Irving four days before confederation. He attended school in The Dock until he was twelve or thirteen years old when his parents moved to the old McRae home in Brooklyn. At that time there was no school in Brooklyn, and he went to Mill River School, then located near Megalloway's Bridge.

As a young man Mr. Wells found his first employment at a store owned by Gordon Matthews (a brother of Jesse Matthews) in Elmsdale, and then at Edward Gordon's store in Alberton. Like many Mar-

time young people of his generation, he then went to the United States and was employed at grocery store in Lynn, Mass., for about ten years. During these years Gordon Matthews left Elmsdale and set up business in Sydney N.S. At his request Mr. Wells left Lynn and again became an employee of Mr. Matthews.

His next move was to "The Northwest", as it was then called in those days. He homesteaded in what became the Province of Saskatchewan a few years later, taking up land at Heward, some eighty miles southeast of Regina. In 1918 he was married to Alice Johnston of his home community, Brooklyn, who travelled to Winnipeg to meet him for the marriage ceremony. They made their home near Vancouver where Mr. Wells entered the real estate business. Two or three years later they returned to Prince Edward Island where they have continued to reside on the old farm in Brooklyn. In addition to farming Mr. Wells entered the Fox business.

Mr. and Mrs. Wells have six children: Arthur in Los Angeles, (Edith) of O'Leary, Isabel in Summerside, Walter in Brooklyn, Mrs. Elwood Smallman (Martha) of Gagetown, N.B., who is presently at home, and Johnston in Edmonton, Alberta. There are eleven grandchildren. Mr. Wells has two sisters and one brother living, Mrs. Robert Wallace in Vancouver, Nellie at home and John in Alberton. Two sisters and one brother have passed away.

While in Saskatchewan, Mr. Wells was interested in agricultural fairs and soon after returning home his experience in this line was of benefit to the Alberton Exhibition. He became its secretary and for many years was one of its most interested and active members of its executive.

Probably there are few ninety year old persons in this Province who hold a driver's licence for the current year. Mr. Wells continues to drive his 1928 Model A Ford which, he proudly claims, will go through much more spring mud than the up-to-date two-tone model owned by his son.

Mr. Wells is in good health and finds employment in doing some chores about his home. His favorite pastimes are reading and word puzzles. He is also interested in radi programs.

Thursday evening he enjoyed a family party in his honor in opening his birthday gifts he was assisted by his little granddaughter, Elaine Palmer. Refreshments included a candlelight birthday cake made by his daughter-in-law Mrs. Walter Wells.

# Sees Less Cancer Risk In Cigarets

PARIS (Reuters) - A French scientist said Monday his research team had made "very encouraging" progress towards eliminating the danger of lung cancer to cigarette smokers.

Dr. Raymond Labarjet, a cancer specialist at the radium institute of Paris University said that analysis of the substances collected by a "robot smoking machine" led to the conclusion that the cigarette paper involved more risk of cancer than the tobacco itself, but the risk from both sources could be considerably reduced by chemical treatment.

His results had been secured by treating the paper with sulfamate of ammonia and the tobacco with certain nitrogenous compounds.

# Fire Destroys Large Barn, Shed At Central Bedeque

Fire last evening at the farm of Mr. Louis McKenna, Central Bedeque completely destroyed a large barn and a machine shed, along with the contents of both. Flames, believed to have started from a tractor in the shed raced through the buildings with electrifying speed.

Mr. McKenna was not at home when the fire was first noticed about 9.40 by Mr. George Green,

who was visiting nearby and along with his father Mr. Harry Green, released a number of calves and saved a milking machine from the barn.

Before doing this the younger Mr. Green made a vain attempt to remove the tractor, which was on fire in the machine shed but was driven back by the intense heat.

A wood shed adjoining the house caught fire but was saved by

neighbors who hauled water from Leard's millpond nearby, saving also a combined pig and hen house with their fine fire fighting efforts. The wind was blowing from a westerly direction and because of this good fortune the home wasn't seriously threatened although water was applied to the roof.

Among the items lost to the flames besides the tractor, were a hayloader, potato cultivator, quantity of grain, fanners, cream smaller items.

The modern 85 x 30 foot barn had a 40 foot "L" attached and is a very heavy loss to Mr. and Mrs. McKenna. The buildings were partly covered by insurance.

# Good Lobster Reported For Fishermen In West Prince

The spring lobster season which ends today on the North shore of Prince Edward Island, was an exceptionally good one for fishermen in Western Prince County. Total landings at Tignish were approximately 750,000 pounds considerably better than the previous spring. Landings at Alberton were slightly below the all time record high set last year. Storm losses during the two-months season were unusually low with no major storms.

About seventy-five percent of

the gear has already been landed. New regulations this year permit the landing of lobsters to day as the end of the season falls on a Sunday and the following day is a public holiday.

Prices are slightly better than last year, averaging about 34 for markets and 30 or better for canners.
