HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 3, 1894.

F. L. HAZARD.—The Governor-General thanks you for your courteous letter of 24th July. His Excellency had expected to cross from Pictou to Charlottetown on the 25th, but Admiral Sir John Higgin's having proposed that His Excellency should sail there on the Blake, the original arrangements will be altered and His Excellency will return via Pictou on Monday, 13th.
