**WIMBLEDON, England (CP)** — Australia's Roy Emerson and Chuck McKinley of the United States, the two top favorites, swept to victories in the opening round of the men's singles championships at Wimbledon Monday.

**McKenney**, 23-year-old Wimbledon champion, took only 55 minutes to down South African Terry Ryan 6-2, 6-1, 6-3, in the opening match of the tournament.

McKenney followed American Dennis Ralston, his country's No. 2 player, was victim of a stunning upset by Tony Pickard of Scotland.

**Pickard**, 26, a former British Davis Cup player, won 3-6, 6-4, 6-7, 9-7 after a battle which lasted more than 2 1/2 hours.

## Resources Ministers Council Gives Day To ARDA Review

The Canadian Council of Resource Ministers devoted most of the day Monday to a preliminary review of the agricultural rehabilitation and development administration, the first of about 70 federal provincial resource agreements that are being negotiated.

The federal and provincial resource ministers and their assistants, holding their third plenary meeting here, heard the ARDA appraisal and reviews of composite forestry agreements.

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Dr. Haviland is expected to complete the resource agreement review later this year. Other agreements now are being appraised.

Two federal and eight provincial resource ministers also will receive a report from a special committee established to appraise certain problems in the field of fisheries and wild life.

They will consider a proposal to launch studies on pollution and conflicts in the use of resources, said by some delegates to be the largest problem in the resource field.

The conference opened Monday, and will end today.
