COMING HOME FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Boers Retreat on Pilgrim's Rest.

SIXTEEN THOUSAND BOER PRISONERS

And Boers Surrendering Every Day Mrs. Kruger is Ill.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—The Imperial volunteers left Cape Town yesterday for home.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—It is stated, according to the Pietermaritzburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, that from 4,000 to 5,000 Boers have retreated on Pilgrim's Rest, northeast of Sydenburg, with four long toms and twenty other guns. The correspondent understands that their long tom ammunition is about exhausted.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Yesterday's despatch says that Mrs. Kruger, wife of the President of the Transvaal, is so ill that the authorities have issued orders forbidding the drivers of vehicles to pass the house except at a walking gait.

Lord Roberts has issued another proclamation dealing very severely with the treacherous Boers' property.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—A despatch from Lord Roberts, dated Friday, Oct. 5, states that the number of prisoners captured or surrendered is daily increased, and now aggregates nearly 16,000 men. Commandant Miller has surrendered to General Cleary, and commandant Dickson and others are on their way to Pretoria to surrender.

A detachment of the London Irish Volunteers endeavored to surprise a party of Boers near Balfonstein, Oct. 4th, but had to retire after three hours fighting, with six men wounded. The Boers suffered heavily.

SATURDAY'S FOOTBALL MATCH

An old-time scene was enacted at Victoria Park Saturday afternoon when a game of football was played in the presence of a large number of spectators. It was a pleasant reminder of other days—of days when the Abegweits were not monarchs of all they surveyed but when the Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's College teams were ready and willing to attack the straggle of the mighty—namely it was a reminder of days when football was the favorite game. Although Saturday's game was merely a "scratch match," the teams being picked from Prince of Wales College and the Abegweits Club, it was not devoid of interest for it was closely contested throughout. The players—whether Buffers or Buffers—went into the game to do their very best and played with a cool determination to win if possible. The presence of such a large number of spectators was very encouraging, and showed plainly that the gridiron is not to be deserted, and that the game is by no means dead. The rain of the forenoon rendered the ground somewhat soft and slippery, but it did not prevent good play. At 4:30 the teams lined up as follows:

In the first half the Buffers did the better work. J. Macmillan scored a touch down which Eric McLean converted into a goal. At half time the score was Buffers 5, Duffers 0.
In the second half the Buffers played with two men off, which greatly weakened their side. L. Seilar secured a try, (which was not counted), for the Buffers, while E. Ritchie, T. Trainor and J. Darke each secured a try for the Duffers. The game was "called" with the score standing, Duffers 9, Buffers 8.
The playing was excellent all around, that of the half backs on both sides being almost faultless, with one exception—there was not enough passing when good opportunities were offered. The quarters and forwards all played well and did good work, while the full backs were not given a great deal to do, but did their part well. There was some swift, clean tackling and some magnificent punting and dribbling. Mr. J. M. Sullivan made an ideal referee, his decisions being satisfactory to all. His coaching was much appreciated by the boys and it is to be hoped he will be often seen upon the field previous to the Thanksgiving Day game, for none is better qualified to give advice than he.
Another game will probably be played tomorrow.
