

# Regina Pats Arrive In Montreal For Memorial Cup Series Opener

MONTREAL, April 26 (CP)—Regina Pats, hustling young junior hockey champions of Western Canada, arrived in Montreal today ready to make their final bid for the Memorial Cup.

The Pats, who can dig up more than a complete juvenile team from their ranks, will meet Montreal Junior Canadiens tomorrow night in the first of the best-of-seven series.

There was no workout for Pats today because of lack of ice in the Forum, where a wrestling show was scheduled tonight. But coach Murray Armstrong's youngsters will get out for a light, loosening-up drill tomorrow.

The boys spent most of the day resting after their train trip and idling around. Sight-seeing tours come later. Tonight they, along with the Canadian team, were dinner guests of general manager Frank Selke of the N. H. L. Canadiens.

A peculiarity of this Memorial Cup final is that both teams are in the junior farm organization of the Montreal N. H. L. club and any number of prospective stars for future professional performance in Montreal will be on parade.

Canadiens, with a rugged team will try to keep in Montreal the cup won last year by Montreal Royals. Most trouble for the Pats is expected to come from the well-balanced line of Billy Goold at centre and Art Rose and Dickie Moore on the wings.

Fresh from their eastern-title victory over Guelph Biltmores, Canadiens will have the advantage of home ice for all but one game of the series.

After tomorrow night's opener, the second game will be played here. The third, next Tuesday, will be played in Maple Leaf Gardens, Toronto, and then the series shifts back to Montreal for the remainder of the struggle.

It is nine years since Montreal fans have seen a Memorial Cup final in the Forum. In 1941 the Royals of that era lost to Winnipeg Rangers, with three of the best-of-five series played in Toronto. This year the setting is all Montreal except for the one game in Toronto.

Captain Armstrong reported his Pats all ready except Lorne Davis, right winger, who is suffering a face infection and will rejoin the team for the third game.

Ted Yarnon, a juvenile, will replace Davis on a line with Merv Bregg and Don Hall.

Pats are expected to show plenty of speed and against Montreal's big threat, first line Regina will have their high-scoring trio of Gord Nowan, Paul Masnick and Ed Litzberger.

Another line will be made up of Hal Cowan, Doug Little and Brian McDonald.

The defence of Morley MacNeill and Jim McCowan are highly rated, along with Joe Sauve, Hal King and Johnny Reev.

CALGARY, April 27 (CP)—One of Conn Smythe's former employees doesn't think much of the tactics of his ex-boss in the current amateur hockey scramble.

Frank (Calgary Albertan) McColl, who earned several play-off shutouts and a collection of stomach ulcers as a wartime goal tender for Toronto Maple Leafs, told Leafs' managing director what he thought of Smythe's threat to withdraw Toronto Marlboros—a Leaf farm club—from the Allan Cup finals unless they were assured of an even break financially in their trip to Western Canada.

"Forgetting about the numerous western clubs that have travelled east at sizable financial losses, the dominating Smythe is apparently outraged by the chance his babies might wind up in the red if they take part in the Allan Cup finals in the west," says Frank.

"Smythe, the instigator of many childish and publicity-seeking performances during his tenure as a National Hockey League mogul, is now starting to throw his weight around in the amateur set-up with the same reckless abandon.

"Such tactics can well be done without, it's high time the amateur bigwigs stepped in and revealed to Canadian fans just who is running the show.

"Toronto has long been known as hog town the world over. It's only actions by such fellows as Smythe that keep that monicker uppermost in the minds of many."

Lawn bowlers would perform at Gage Park, within five minutes walk of the athletes' living quarters. Officials have a strong talking point in the fact venues are so tightly centred. "In addition," concludes the report, "Hamilton track and field meets are recognized across Canada as probably the smoothest-run in the Dominion and this reputation could add prestige to its official bid."

Taking all these facts and figures into consideration, Hamilton certainly has plenty to offer to back up their request to have the 1954 games held there, and unless the other leading Cities can go that much better, it is a fair bet that Hamilton will be the chosen site for the big athletic event. If the other contenders, however, can match or better Hamilton's facilities, there is one factor that might be in favor of one of the other Cities making application. Hamilton has already had the honor of holding the Empire Games there, even if it was twenty years ago, and it just might be that official opinion will be in favor of giving one of the others a chance to put on the show.

## Yankees Overpower Boston Red Sox 10-2

New York Yankees Wednesday overpowered Boston Red Sox 10-2 in pounding a quartet of pitchers for seven extra-base hits including home runs by Hank Bauer and Yogi Berra.

Young Maury McDermott bore the brunt of the Yankee cannon-ading as he yielded five runs in the first two innings. The Yanks, playing at home, levelled McDermott for four runs in the first inning and were never headed as Eddie Lopat muzzled the Red Sox with eight hits. Walt Masterson was touched for two runs in the fourth on a single, a triple by Phil Rizzuto and Berra's fly ball.

The Yanks picked up another run in the sixth off rookie Gordon Mueller and completed their scoring in the eighth against bonus righthander Frank Quinn.

"The victory was the Yanks' third over the Red Sox in four meetings this year.

At St. Louis, the rampaging Detroit Tigers wrested a hard earned 8-5 decision from St. Louis Browns in 10 innings to sweep the two-game series and hand the Browns their fifth straight defeat. It was the American League's sixth victory in seven starts.

The Tigers jumped on ailing Cliff Fannin for five runs in the second inning. The Browns rallied gamely to tie the score but the Tigers pushed over two runs in the first overtime inning to clinch the decision. Singles by George Kell and Pat Mullin followed a walk to Eddie Lipon to account for the deciding tallies.

Nine pitchers saw service. Paul Calvert being the winner and Ed Albrecht the loser.

The Cleveland-Chicago contest was postponed on account of cold weather.

At Philadelphia the Athletics wasted a five-hit relief job by Carl Scheib as Washington Senators took a 5-3 decision. Veteran righthander Sid Hudson was stingy with safeties in the pinches, leaving 10 A's stranded.

Al Evans was the big gun in Washington's attack against starter Bobby Shantz and Scheib. He drove in four runs with two hits, belting a three-run homer off Shantz in the second inning.

## St. Louis Cards Turn Back Cincinnati 3-2

Howie Pollet, St. Louis Cards' star pitcher, showed his old form Wednesday in turning back the weak-hitting Cincinnati Reds 3-2. It was his first National League victory in three starts.

Pollet, who allowed only five hits, had a bad minute in the third when Stan Musial dropped what would have been a third out and Johnny Wyrostek tripled, scoring two runners and putting the Reds in front, 2-1.

Heavy-hitting Musial made up for the error in the fifth, when he drove home the tying run with a triple. Enos Slaughter then brought him home with what proved to be the winning run.

The Cards swept a two-game series with the yet-to-win Reds.

Kent Peterson, young leftie, was the losing pitcher.

Cold weather and wet grounds caused postponement of the New York-Boston game.

In a night game at Brooklyn Pe Wee Reese singled with the bases loaded in the 10th to give Brooklyn Dodgers a 5-4 triumph over Philadelphia Phils in a game played under Philadelphia protest.

Home runs by Jim Russell, Duke Snider and Roy Campanella accounted for the other Dodger runs.

While Jones sent the game into overtime with a three-run homer for the Phils in the ninth.

The Phils lodged their protest in the Dodge 10th when a long fly ball to left by Campanella was ruled a ground-rule double.

Dick Sisler apparently caught the ball near the wall, but umpire Babe Pinell ruled a fan had interfered and waved Campanella to second.

Snider, on first at the time, advanced to third. There was one out at the time.

Pinch-hitter George Shuba was intentionally walked to load the bases and Reese followed with a long drive to left, which Sisler made no attempt to catch, for a game-winning single.

## Aga Khan's Palestine Wins British Race

NEWMARKET, England, April 26 (AP)—Palestine, who can run as fast as any horse in these parts, lasted just long enough today to whip the American-bred Prince Simon in the Two Thousand Guineas, first major event of the flat-racing season.

Only the tip of a grey nose separated the Aga Khan's speedster and the huge, handsome bay colt owned by William Woodward, New York banker and leading American owner on British tracks.

The judges called for a photograph and debated seven minutes before making the finish official. Masked Light was third, five lengths away.

Palestine set a record for the race of 1:36 4-5. The old mark of 1:37 3-5 by Sunstar had stood since 1913.

Palestine, in winning, showed critics that he can run a mile. Both his jockey, Charlie Smirke, and his trainer, Marcus Marsh, admitted that a mile is the limit.

"He just stayed the mile," said Marsh. "He definitely will not run in the Derby. That's a mile and a half."

On the other hand, Prince Simon convinced the experts that he'll be just right for the May 27 Derby.

He had been quoted at 13 to 2 and one bookmaker guessed his price would drop as far as 5 to 2 within a week. Only an hour after the race today, bookies at the track were laying 3 to 1 against the Prince for the Derby.

Nineteen horses started over the firm course, which was called good even though it had rained and snowed for three days.

The race was worth £11,400 (\$34,616) for the winner—the original 2,000 guineas plus added money.

Keyser was minor-league secretary of St. Louis Browns at the time of his death.
